SALLY was inspired by realizing that a tree gives stability, strength and giving life, persistence and inspiration to be a demonstration of these qualities.



NANCY CHAN introduced our speaker, Cynthia Butler, Santa Clara

County Master Gardener. Her topic was "Bees in a Nutshell" as she only had 30 minutes with us. Although already highly



educated, Cynthia decided to study "bees" at UC as a second career. She is the Master Gardener at



Marital Cottle Park in Santa Clara County. Cynthia encouraged us to visit the park, and join one of her regularly scheduled tours. Bees are

the most important pollinators in the world. They depend on eating pollen and nectar to feed themselves and their progeny. The plants depend on the bees for pollination and fertilization. We humans and other animals depend on both the plants and the bees for a lot of the food we eat. There are 20,000 bee species in the world, and 1600 bee species native to California. There are many threats to bee survival (and indirectly, to us). Colony collapse disorder is serious. Although many bees live in large colonies. 70% of all bees live in the ground by themselves. Some herbicides are absorbed by plants, which spread herbicide to the plant pollen. When the bees eat the pollen, they get some herbicide, too. Bad for the bees. Bad for us. This is just a random, anecdotal report of Cynthia's very informative talk.
