

SPEAKERS: Returning from retirement, Hawaiian shirt-clad "DEPARTING MEL" introduced all three .

DAN QUINN briefly reviewed his career spanning physics,



business and finance. He then revealed his transformational visit with member JERRY ELKIND to Evolution Valley in the Sierras which focused him on what he is CALLED to do: family, photography, and travel. Next he highlighted milestones in his life, starting with a picture of him as a small baby in Washington, D.C. where his father was an FBI agent. He moved to Francisco as a child, then to Palo Alto and San Mateo.

He married his Austrailian wife Ellen, in 1966, celebrating their exceptional partnership during two-thirds of his life. As a post doc, they traveled to Hamburg and Nepal. He then shared a photo of his family, including his daughter and the woman she married three times--due to changing social norms--and have two adopted childreen. Also showed his son and granddaughter in Antigua. He served on the board of Hidden Villa, offering kudos to former executive director JUDITH STEINER.

Photography is his focus, sharing breathtaking photos of a rainbow and wildlife, including those featuring a pair of white tail kites tranferring their chick while in flight. Can we tag along with you, Dan, on your photo expeditions???

JUDITH STEINER: From the podium she announced and demontrated that she is a "flag-waving American." As a child she said the Pledge of Allegiance and Lord's Prayer in school. However, she now never says the Pledge of Allegiance and



wondered if we had ever noticed that at our meetings. She considers that Rotary is international. She then compared the US with Europe in the practice of pledging allegiance, having lived in Austria and noting the anti-American sentiment

there in sthe 1960's. Then JUDITH shared the history of the Pledge. In 1885 a Civil War veteran named Col. Balch devised the first pledge to help unify the divided nation--"We give our heads and our hearts to God and our country; one country, one language, one flag." In 1892, as part of the 400th anniversary of Columbus, a former Baptist minister named Bellamy was asked to write a new pledge: "I pledge allegiance

to my flag and the republic for which it stands, one nation, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all." Both were used in

1923, but changing the wording in 1924 to "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America" at a time when hundreds of flags were distributed to schools to greet the



many new immigrants. That pledge included a salute with the right arm outstretched toward the flag, palm down, and ended with palm up. In 1942 that salute's similarity to the Nazi salute was replaced by a new salute--placing the right hand over heart. The pledge and that salute were then adopted by Congress. A final revision was made in 1954 when "under God" was added. In 2008 and 2009 Congress authorized all military personel

and veterans to render that salute when viewing the flag raising/lowering, at the flag's presentation, or during the National Anthem.

STEVE PLAYER: At the podium, STEVE assured everyone the there would be no auction and that wallets were safe. STEVE shared that the direction of his life flowed with SERENDIPITY. Given the chance to join AFS, he went to Norway in high school and then went to Boys State. He studied at Stanford and Hastings Law School. Then due to a college football shoulder injury, he was bypassed by the Marines. Hence, he and wife spent a year in England. In 1967 finding no jobs available, he happened upon a job opening which he had not sought out; but with no interview, he accepted the job of a man just fired. Serendipity.

As an attorney he represented Bill Hewlett and worked with BILL ALHOUSE, WALT HAYS AND SAM WEBSTER who became his mentor, selling him a house on Tasso when he needed one--as well as bringing him into Rotary. His work with Bill Miller serendipitously led him to Bill's daughter Nancy, now his wife--36 happy years and going strong.

After 14 years at Stanford, was named its Planned Giving Officer and lawyer. And the office where interviewed for that was the same where he had been interviewed for his football position.

STEVE'S WISDOM: Life is not a planned path...just accept and embrace serendipity.
