Tim Watson, Chair of the World Community Service Committee, introduced Stephanie Klose and Lucas Pinzon of Esperanza Juvenil (Boys Hope Girls Hope), which is an organization that our club supported last year with a grant of \$8000. This boarding school in

Guatemala nurtures and guides kids who are motivated

but whose families cannot support their education. 50% are of Mayan background (many learning Spanish for the



first time), 60% are girls. The goal is that they graduate from college. In Guatemala, 8% of children access college and only 2% graduate, but 100% of these students graduate from college!

PRESIDENT'S CLUB: DUANE KALAR described a 2004



sailing trip on which he met DICK BUSH. They talked about Polio, and Duane described Rotary's involvement in reducing Polio, inviting Dick to consider joining Rotary. Duane contributed \$1200 to the Rotary Foundation in Dick's honor.

PROGRAM – Geo Blackshire, Palo Alto Fire Chief



LIZ KNISS introduced Chief Blackshire, who joined the Palo Alto Fire Department in 1997 just after graduating from college. He was appointed interim chief in January 2019, and promoted to chief in June. The mission statement adopted by the firefighting team is, "We are a professional team of men and women dedicated to safeguarding and enriching the lives on anyone, anytime and anywhere with compassion and pride."

Most calls are for medical emergencies, and predictions are that will increase by almost 50% over the next 10 years as the population ages. They have a paramedic on every vehicle that goes out, and Palo Alto operates its own ambulance service for quicker service.

Palo Alto also shares resources with others: four team members went to help fight the Camp Fires in 2018, and two went to Florida recently to help with Hurricane Dorian.

Chief Blackshire shared his three goals:



• Maintain the good response times, even as demand increases. Currently, 94% of medical responses are within 8 minutes, 89% of fire within 8 minutes.

• Increase diversity, with a focus on women. The number of women has decreased to 6 out of about 100 professionals. He has a variety of strategies in mind to bring that number up.

• Focus on firefighter mental wellness. More firefighters die of suicide that die fighting fires. Chief Blackshire wants to change the culture to acknowledge vulnerability and recognize when someone needs help.
