Past Pres. GINNY LEAR announced that The Rotary Foundation fundriasing letter is in the mail, and the goal is to meet at least last year's goal of \$25,000. The funds support PolioPlus and the World Community Service programs, which you will hear more about the first week of October from TIM WATSON.

Past Pres. GINNY LEAR introduced the invited speaker ROBERT KELLEY, the artistic director of TheatreWorks, which is celebrating both its 50th year of productions and winning the prestigious

2019 Tony award for Regional Theater, first in California since 1997.

Robert Kelley grew up in Palo Alto, went to Stanford and started his



own theater production in the 1970s. By now he has been directing 175 of TheatreWorks' world and regional productions.

In its first three years, the company had four staff and many productions in parks and the Baylands Interpretive Center, it became a nonprofit in 1976, then a regional theater. The company became nationally recognized with the production of "Popcorn", which protested the Vietnam War.

Promoting diversity, innovation,

professional quality and education, ThearerWorks engages now over 20,000 students every year, including children at risk at the Lucile Packard Children's Hospital, has many productions going to Broadway and London. Shows one staged in Menlo Park, are now at the Palo Alto Lucie Stern Center hosting the summer Shakespeare shows and the Mountain View Center for Performing Arts.

From an early 1970's starting employment of \$200/month which gave the punch line for TheaterWorks: "Theater works, but it doesn't pay", TheatreWorks grew to a current budget of \$11mil/year with contributions from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Hewlett and Packard Foundations, private donors and subscribers. An interesting piece of data offered ROBERT KELLEY was that even though we are in Silicon Valley, 95% corporate giving goes outside the area.

The role of TheatreWorks was highlighted by HENRIETTA BURROUGHS, TRISH BUBENIK, LAURIE LISTON and JUDY KLEINBERG who all thanked ROBERT KELLEY for the personal impact TheatreWorks has had on them, and for some, on their children's education and personal development over the past 50 vears.

With a question from DANA TOM about growth and stability going forward, ROBERT KELLEY described the ups-and-downs of the theater under periods of economic stress. Even though the production revenue for TheatreWorks is a small percentage, the commitment from the community, with encouragement and support, is essential for the livelihood of the arts.

In answering JUDY KLEINBERG's inquiry about challenges for live theater in the era of internet entertaining, ROBERT KELLEY summarized the value of a live performance vs flat screen shows with a very clear analogy: "The difference between a phone call and a date". He ended with an invitation to check upcoming performances at theaterworks.org or call 650-463-1960 for a live date at one of the TheaterWorks shows!

LE LEVY noted that the wall inside the Rinconada Library, a display of photos of Palo Altans honored at the time of the city's centennial, featured today's speaker ROBERT KELLEY, already notable twenty-five years ago.
