

SALLY TOMLINSON introduced each of 12 speakers in today's program. The Pinion writer points out that these brief notes are just the start of a great conversation one could have with any of these members.





LYLE CONNELL, US Navy, stationed at Naval Ordance Labratory in Washington, D.C. In April 1945, on duty watch, Lyle was one of the first to know that President Roosevelt had died.

BILL BUSSE, US Navy Reserve, Naval Aviation – 1950, reflected on hearing a blast in Arizona while in school. It came from near Alamagordo, NM, and was the first testing of the atomic bomb. Then as a pilot flying over Hiroshima not many years later, Bill saw the rubble remaining from the bomb dropped in 1945.

Captain ED DANGLER US Navy for 30 years, 1950-1980, recalled transporting North Vietnamese civilians to South Vietnam, and of duty during the Cuban Missile Crisis.

GEOFF ZIMAN, Drafted into the British Army – 1954-56. Royal Corps of Electrical and Mechanical Engineers. He described a boondoggle trip to Trieste, but left to our imagination his time with the tank regiment in Germany.

ART STAUFFER – US Navy – June 1955 graduated from Stanford, joined Navy OCS and described his time with rogue crews and unusu al captains on an oiler in the Pacific.

DON MORGAN – US Navy pilot, told us a story about these mysterious letters on the wall of a bar: IITYWYBMAD.

ROB LANCEFIELD – US Army – 8 years Active and Reserve, spoke from personal experience for all of the children of veterans who have suffered from PTSD.

DUANE KALAR – USAF Captain, Dental Corps, 1961-1963. Sent to St. Lawrence Island, Alaska, 30 miles from Russia, heard himself being welcomed on Radio Moscow.

KEVIN CURRY – US Army – 1960, remembered his brother to us, who was in Vietnam and suffered damaging effects of Agent Orange.

MIKE MCMAHON – US Navy – 1960, 8 years in nuclear submarines, including the Nautilus, and the Sculpin which could go 20 knots under water. His Navy father was lost at sea.

PETER SHAMBORA – US Naval Aviation – 10 years, 1967 – 1977. Commissioned at Pensacola. In charge of helicopters that recovered the Apollo 14 astronauts, the 3rd mission of men on the moon.

BILL FOGARTY – US Army 1st Lt. infantry, 1969-1972, in Vietnam. Bill remembered his three USF classmates, two of whom died in service and one who has suffered life-long effects of PTSD and agent orange. Bill's father was in the Army in London when a V-bomb struck some children who had just received chocolate from him. His father suffered a breakdown after that. Bill read a brief story about what service to this country means. Bill urged us to say "Thank you for your service." It is appreciated.

The meeting ended with a standing ovation and admiration for our speakers and all who have served.
