

TODAY'S SPEAKER, PHILIP KAMIH: Introduced by BETSY BECHTEL, Mr.

Kamih returned to Palo Alto from Los Angeles to take the position of Director of Transportation this past August. As the chief transportation official, he presented an overview of Palo Alto traffic issues, planning priorities, new programs and the department's first budget. He reports directly to the City Manager and is particularly interested in engaging community members in transportation



project planning and evaluation, especially as railroad grade separation options are explored. He highlighted the unique "Safe Routes to School" planning efforts funded by the city and noted that 68% of residents use transportation alternatives to single occupancy cars. He encouraged people to contact 311 to report and track specific transportation concerns/issues. While he acknowledged the members' concern over the reality of TOO much traffic in town, he wants his office to work to enhance quality of life in PA.

DANA adjourned the meeting after a lively Q & A session.
