With Marconi, he helped build atomic power facilities in the vacuum tube era. He came to California to join Ampex. In 1972, he established ZiTech Instrument Corporation, an import/export

business, balancing his time on the job with reading, sailing and otherwise enjoying the outdoors. He joined Rotary 37 years ago. Geoff has taken great pride in his work as a Red Cross disaster volunteer and his service in many roles with the Boy Scouts. Married to Ann for 60 years, he has four children, 11 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren, including three sons and four grandsons who are Eagle Scouts

NINA MOORE born in Cairo, Egypt, grew up enjoying summers on "the clear blue waters of the Mediterranean." She received bachelor's and master's



degrees from the American University of Cairo. At the urging of her mother, she moved to New York, where she studied for a Ph.D. in business at Bernard Baruch College. She went on to teach marketing and consumer behavior at CUNY, Bernard Baruch and the Fashion Institute of Technology; she greatly enjoyed being at FIT in the 1980's, a tumultuous time for fashion.
