PROGRAM – Gennady Sheyner, Karen Holman, and Tom DuBois: "The Roth Building and the Palo Alto History Museum"

DIANA DIAMOND introduced Gennady Sheyner, a journalist with the Palo Alto Weekly. Sheyner then introduced Karen Holman, former city councilmember and current president of Mid-Peninsula Regional Open Space District, and Tom DuBois, Vice Mayor of Palo Alto City.

Gennady Sheyner: In 2000, the City bought the Roth building from the Palo



Alto Clinic. The PA History Museum and the city spent 5 years negotiating, and there were no other bidders. The museum and city signed the option agreement in 2007. After a series of extensions, the council in 2017 challenged the museum board to raise the remaining money needed; museum raised some but a shortfall of about \$4 million remains and some pledges are quite old. On March 2, 2020, the council voted to open it up

for new bids, but COVID-19 happened and other priorities have taken precedence. The process for creating a new RFP has been pushed back to late May, but even that is looking unlikely. Meanwhile, on April 24, the History museum was awarded a County grant to restore the murals and the roof for total of \$300,000.

Karen Holman: The building is important for many reasons that include its



architecture, its murals, and the history of its use in Palo Alto. The museum project would restore the building for various community uses. The estimated cost of the project stands at \$12.3 million, with \$8.59 million pledged. That leaves a \$4 million gap. The history museum is a new organization which makes fundraising more challenging.

Tom Dubois: He was the only council member to vote in favor of continuing with the history museum. In a 5-1 vote, the other council members denied funding the \$4 million gap and voted to open up the project again with a new RFP. DuBois said they seem to question the need for a history museum.
