Beside a Scout Troop, our club also sponsors Palo Alto Cub Scout



SALLY TOMLINSON introduced our speaker James Campbell, Professor of History at Stanford who provided us with interesting insight into the topic of African-American History and Reparations. As



a base to his talk, he used a project he had headed at Brown

University. That comprehensive study detailed the involvement of the Rhode Island community in the slave trade and recommended ways in which amends might be made for the injustices committed.

The important point that Professor

Campbell made and stressed is that thinking about reparations in financial terms was fraught with many difficulties and that there were other practical steps that could be taken.

In the lengthy Q & A session following the talk, Professor Campbell made clear his view on both police practices and prisons. Although he abhorred the many aspects of their injustices to black people, society still needed these institutions. It was interesting that this distinguished speaker noted that his early academic career had been enhanced by receiving a Rotary scholarship.
