A brief video highlighted recent news that the continent of Africa is polio free, without a single case in four years. Vaccines will continue to be given.

club in February and is a frequently invited Rotary




speaker who shares his personal life experience as a child whose mother contracted polio and lived in an iron lung for 13 years.



DANA TOM introduced ENOCH CHOI, Urgent Care



Physician, who spoke about "Serving on the COVID-19 Front Lines". Dr. CHOI is the recipient of US and CA congressional recognition, the Palo Alto Tall Tree 2019, PAMF Service Award 2017, SF Business Times Health Hero 2013, and Silicon Valley Business Journal 2011 Health

Hero.

Dr. CHOI spoke about the impact COVID-19 impact on the mental health of health care workers, due to extra work



shifts imposed by overstaffing during March-May and aggravated by the constant change in protocols. and the confluence of the violence of social movements and the health impact of wildfires. He also mentioned the anti-Asian discrimination. which he has experienced all his life

as a child and in college, and which has escaladated since March to create an unprecedented fear for safety.

Dr. CHOI mentioned his work with the Santa Clara Valley Medical Center "backpack medicine" providing care to isolated communities outside the reach of regular MDs, including homeless, and the work through Jordan International Aid and Rotary in major natural disasters of the last decade.
