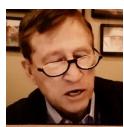

Our speaker, the award-winning author and food scientist, Harold



McGee, was introduced by BEN THRELKELD. Described by Bill Buford of the New Yorker as "the most important person alive writing about food," Harold joined us to discuss his latest book, Nose Dive: A Field Guide to the World's Smells. Fascinating topics discussed include the smell of outer space (ammonia, egg smell/hydrogen sulfide, esters (characteristic of various citrus fruits) and the smell

and composition of caramel (sucrose plus heat), which was described as the epitome of the magic of cooking. By adding heat to sucrose, caramel results, transforming it from odorless and sweet to deliciously odorous, sour and bitter. The smell of caramel, like other smells, is a composite; it is like a musical chord with different notes as individual smells, that put together give us the overall impression of caramel (paraphrasing). In Japan, a practice of sitting quietly and smelling different kinds of incense or wood is roughly translated as "listening to smells." Harold encouraged everyone to listen to smells; the more we pay attention to them, the more we will notice echoes and resonances. He added, don't take this sense of smell for granted; we have a lot to gain by paying attention to this primal sense that we have for a reason.
