she moved to the United Kingdom, traveling a lot throughout Europe. The US she finds a very democratic country, but so different at least in California that adjustments are difficult. Many of her friends don't like it here, at least at the start. She lives in "a very interesting time", and enjoys getting acquainted over a glass of wine. In Q&A, SPENCER said Thailand was the most exotic place he has seen. He loves the food there, his wife hates it. KIM grew up in Southern California and has lived in Taiwan, China, and Singapore. For RENATA, the most difficult adjustment was to suburban living.
