
TRISH BUBENIK urged us to start buying tickets for our March 29 fundraiser, "Hats

as well, to nonor George P. Schultz, who served two American presidents in four Cabinet-level positions. "He showed how much can be achieved by building bridges. He was a champion of truthfulness and decency."

Our speaker, Dr. Marc Tessier-Lavigne, was introduced by DIANA DIAMOND. Dr. Tessier-Lavigne received undergraduate degrees from McGill University and at

Oxford, where he was a Rhodes Scholar. He earned a Ph.D. in physiology from University College London. He held faculty positions at UCSF and Stanford before becoming a senior vice president for research at Genentech. He was president of Rockefeller University in New York from 2011 until appointment as president at Stanford in 2016.

Dr. Tessier-Lavigne said that he wanted the University under his leadership to focus on "boldness, inclusivity and a commitment to



improving the world...." The COVID crisis has taught Stanford three significant lessons: There's a need far areater urgency for in accelerating the application of knowledge, such as in hastening trials of new therapies. Education and health care have been forced overnight to become more accessible in entirely new ways. Finally. Stanford's public mission and its

relationship with the community have changed. "Pre-COVID, the ease of travel meant that we were less appreciative of local resources than we now must be." Stanford has established an Office of External Relations led by Megan Fogarty to strengthen its links to the community as a "fully engaged neighbor." Added Dr. Tessier-Lavine: "We at Stanford share the commitment to service that you exemplify here at Rotary."

From MTL's answers to our questions: Stanford must become "more intentional and visible" in serving the world beyond the campus, for example through online instruction.... The COVID epidemic has had a severe impact on small colleges that rely on tuition income to fund operations. As many as 10% of such colleges may exit, eliminating close-to-home opportunities for an underserved constituency.... To ensure that the University is open to students regardless of their financial status, it is now Stanford's policy that undergraduates from US families with annual income under \$150,000 will attend tuition-free, and those from families with income under \$150,000 and \$250,000. As a result, students with financial need can attend Stanford for less money that would be required for UC or Cal State.
