CASH referred to the email about the United Nations climate change conference, known as COP26, attended by Rotary International President Shekhar Mehta who joined he Rotary delegation in Glascow, Scotland.

He then celebrated the Endowment Fund's addition of \$71,000 donation to the \$100,000 pledged by five generous Rotarians. Chair BETSY BECHTEL urged all to help support the remaining \$29,000 needed to invest in our charitable work. CASH also noted that the Centennial Committee will soon set the fundraising goals leading up to our major Centennial event in April.

It turns out Rotary International published world-wide memberships at 1.4 million in 46,000 clubs. Takamatsu, Japan is not a Palo Alto sister city but five are: Albi, France;

Enschede, Netherlands; Linkoping, Sweden; Oaxaca, Mexico; and Palo, Philippines. CHESLEY DOUGLAS was motivated to work with the City of Palo Alto to display sister cities in front of City Hall and architect BILL BUSSE designed and built the sign post display. DANA TOM introduced our speaker Dr. Terri Givens, Political Science Professor, McGill University in Montreal. Her topic was "Radical Empathy: Finding a Path

to Bridging Racial Divides," also the title of her latest book. Dr. Givens is also the CEO and founder of Brighter Higher Ed, which focuses on reinventing higher education leadership with changing demographics, financial challenges and advances in educational technology. She also served as Vice Provost at Texas University and Provost of Menlo College (first African American and woman), professorships at UT and Washington U. At Menlo she led faculty and staff in developing programs for first generation students, updating curriculum and infrastructure for evidencebased assessmentShe works to develop leaders with an understanding of the importance of diversity and encourages personal growth through empathy.

She shared three of six steps to accomplish that vulnerability to challenge misunderstandings and stereotypes, such as unequal health needs. The second step is be grounded in who you are. Menlo Park has few people of color and has a history of not selling homes to non-Whites—a community behind in diversity. The third step is to be open to the expectations of others and to take action to create change. She shared the example of working with the school district and the city of Menlo Park to help the police force build trust.

Dr. Givens emphasized the need to work on trying to feel what others feel. She emphasized leaders must learn to understand others, put themselves in others' shoes. She strongly recommended telling personal stories to trigger

empathy--telling how things impact you and pointed to



empathy with COVID and mental health and wellness.

CASH thanked TRISH BUBENIK, Pinion reporter. LYLE CONNELL, Pinion editor, and DANA TOM, Zoom co-host.
