PROGRAM

STANS KLEIJNEN introduced today's speaker, Jeannet Kiessling, a Board member of Neighbors Abroad and Founder of Kleine Herzen, which provides support to orphaned children in Ukraine.

Jeannet began her talk by describing what she would have discussed two months ago, before the Russian invasion of Ukraine; the 12 orphanages Kleine Herzen



has built; the programs it has run, including a center for street children who previously had been living in trash dumps; the refugee housing they have provided in the Donbas region, where war has been raging for 14 years; and the orphanage it provided in a remote area for 120 severely handicapped children who stayed in boxes because there were not enough beds. These, she said, were the good times, and what she would have liked to have talked about just two months ago.

Ms. Kiessling also discussed how her interest in Ukraine began. While working in Angela Merkel's government in the 1990s, she was part of discussions in which it was argued that Ukraine was part of Europe and should become part of Nato or Europe. At the time, she recalled being embarrassed that was not an option for Ukraine or any other former soviet republic; Europe was not prepared to make them part of European Union. That all changed with Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

Two weeks before the invasion, Ms. Kiessling asked a friend what would happen if Putin actually invaded. There was so much evidence that he would, but people didn't believe it. She wanted to evacuate some staff and return them once the risk of invasion blew over, but since these were family orphanages, guardians would not leave families behind. Then the invasion happened, and they were regularly checking cell phones hoping not to get a call with bad news. Some had to take shelter in monasteries when the shelling became too much. So she reached out to her contacts in charge of children's rights in Ukraine, and helped children in privately funded orphanages evacuate Ukraine and move to safe locations all over Europe. Then she quickly realized that the children in the state orphanages also needed to be evacuated.

Ms. Kiessling showed a video of the unbelievable crisis facing these orphaned children-- many with serious disabilities -- and the traumatic circumstances they are facing. Many were safely relocated out of Ukraine but it is unclear where they ultimately will settle. Now Kleine Herzen is in emergency mode, trying to evacuate orphaned children from state-run orphanages. This is its current focus.

CLOSING

CASH thanked Ms. Kiessling for enlightening Rotarians about the important work that Kleine Herzen is doing for orphaned children in Ukraine. Thanks to our guests for attending, and to the meeting volunteers.
