At precisely 12:30 pm on Monday, July 22, **KAREN ROHDE** rang the Rotary bell vigorously yet with smooth control to inaugurate her term as our club's President....

REBECCA GERALDI and **KATIE SEEDMAN** introduced guests: Hasan Musa, new to the area, a start-up founder, and Matthew Hamamjy, assistant wrestling coach at Paly and high-tech finance professional.... Karen noted that each year, there are four holidays that we observe with the Pledge of Allegiance: Independence Day, Labor Day. Veterans' Day and Memorial Day. She called on **RALPH ADAMS** to lead the Pledge for those who chose voluntarily to participate.

Karen explained that she will emphasize **"Building Community"** as a theme for the Rotary Year. Members are invited each Monday to offer a Thought for the Day – a quotation, inspiring story, or reminiscence – that illustrates the concept of "Building Community" and other ideals of Rotary.

THOUGHT FOR THE DAY

On cue, **LE LEVY** stepped forward with this week's Thought. Le said it was an honor to offer opening remarks at **the first meeting of our club's 101st year**. He was pleased to support Karen's theme. The challenge, Le said, was that recently, we haven't been good at building better friendships, and the cause has been problems with politics. He confessed that sometimes, he has been quick to express a low opinion of anyone who holds views that don't match his. "My reaction is often just to disregard that person, not listen, not consider their views worthy. I'm often so intent about letting them know how wrong they are that I don't stop to understand their point of view. Certainly, that's not the way to build community...." Le said, "This year, my goal is to *listen with respect* to those I don't agree with, to step back and, with sincerity, ask them why they believe as they do, and then to listen to them with patience." He added, "Karen, I like your theme, and this year I will do my best to build community by listening with respect to everyone."

Remaining at the podium, Le invited us to join



in honoring Karen with a song to celebrate her presidency asking us to stand and sing: *Hello, Karen,*

Yes, hello, Karen, It's great to see you here where you belong.
