TODAYS PROGRAM

CHARLIE WEIDANZ introduced Lisa Blanchard to speak briefly about the Grateful Garment Project, which is the beneficiary of today's hands-on service project assembling dignity kits.



Lisa Blanchard. **Executive Director** and founder of the Grateful Garment Project, has seen the group expand into 52 counties. This is a nonprofit whose purpose is to restore dignity to anyone who has suffered sexual assault. If you are a victim of sexual assault seeking medical attention

and a rape kit is performed, you must remove



and surrender all your clothes, and then have your body examined. You have nothing to wear home, and the hospital will only have hospital gowns. The Grateful

Garment Project provides Dignity Kits to

hospitals, shelters, and law enforcement. Today's work by our club to build 96 kits will have an impact on 96 people. PA Rotary is one of the major donors to the Grateful Garment – this is the 5th time we have done a project for them. They receive no government funding.



Right now, August-November, we are in the "Red Zone," which is the time when most of the sexual assaults on college campuses take place. Please talk to the young people you know who are going off to college this year, about being safe and about consent.

Others said it felt good to have the person respond back with exactly what you said – you felt heard. **HAL MICKELSON** was impressed that **JEFF YEN** heard everything Hal said.

Karen hopes that we can incorporate this practice into real world experiences.


