#### **TODAYS PROGRAM**

**GEOFF BALL** introduced the day's speaker,

issues relating to

China for 57 years, since the Nixon Administration and under Ford and Carter.... As Mark Twain supposedly said, Wagner's music was "not as bad as it sounds"; in the same way, U.S./China relations are fraught, but "not nearly as bad as the prevailing narrative would have us believe...." China today remains authoritarian and has increased control of its people as it has modernized. Its double-digit growth ended 13 years ago. Unlike its neighboring "tiger" economies, it has developed only to be a middle income country, and in many categories (for example, the capabilities of its workforce), it rates below nations like Mexico.... It is "wobbly," "no longer an irresistible juggernaut...." One weakness for China is a bifurcated educational system that leaves the rural population behind, with the result that half the workforce is ill-prepared to deal with current technology.... Americans are problem solvers, comfortable with social movements and business ideas that start at the bottom and climb up, whereas the Chinese continue to rely on leadership from on high that signals what must happen in the future.... U.S. foreign policy tends to focus on problems that have domestic political implications; we find it easiest to work with international partners that have interests and views most like our own.

Dr. Fingar argued that we must cooperate with China where possible, compete with China where necessary, and confront China where we have no other choice (rather than bending over backward to avoid conflict).... Dr. Fingar suggested that we keep in mind that "op-ed" columns are written by the people who are losing the policy debate within government, so they will always tilt to the negative.... The Chinese "play up" our gridlock and other hard-to-explain behavior; they are "spring-loaded to give us our comeuppance," so for them our problems have exaggerated significance. Dr. Fingar observed that America is "in decline" only in the sense that we're no longer growing faster than everyone else.
