

TODAY'S PROGRAM

MIKE REYNOLDS

introduced today's speaker, **Robert Freeman**, the Executive Director of The Global Uplift Project (TGUP), as one of the most passionate, tenacious



ever met. Robert is a historian who focuses on the future, putting his skills to work on the front lines to change the world. After experiencing homelessness in high school, Mr. Freeman spent 6 years with the Merchant Marines, obtained an undergraduate degree from Santa Clara University, and then received an MBA from Stanford. This was followed by a successful career in the computer field, from which he retired in his 40s. He then became a high school teacher in Los Altos. In 2007, Mr. Freeman founded One Dollar For Life, a non-profit that morphed into TGUP.

In 2012, with ODFL, he received the SF 49ers' "Bay Area Teacher of the Year" award. The title of today's presentation was: **"A** simple plan to change the world."



As a high school teacher, Mr. Freeman challenged his students to do something small and see if it would change the world. He issued a challenge to them that if everyone gave one dollar, he would build a classroom somewhere in Africa. For two weeks in the summer of 2007, they held a drive called "One Dollar for Life" The drive grew to include a few other area high schools, and successfully raised \$9,000 dollars; enough to build the promised classroom. The program has now funded 22 projects in some of the poorest countries in the world. Projects include classrooms, water wells, medical clinics, libraries, science labs, playgrounds, latrines, and more.

Essential to the program is that the community that will receive the project must contribute to the project. When a village in Malawi asked for help with a classroom, the program purchased primary materials and the members of the community made the 160,000 bricks needed to build 5 classrooms. The project also provided rooftop solar panels to power the computers. In Nepal, ladies from the community formed a human chain to

move 20,000 bricks from the ground to the roof of the school so that a second story could be built.

The program is tackling other problems that are rooted in poverty. Adolescent girls

who cannot manage their hygiene during their period cannot attend school. TGUP provides adolescent girls with washable, reusable sanitary pads that last 3 years. These essential supplies keep girls in school for a mere \$2 each. A well dug in one community allowed for the planting of two crops per year instead of one, increasing food and reducing hunger. The provision of cows for an orphanage provided milk for protein to small children who had none.

Rotarians have been very supportive of the TGUP. Rotary helped remodel a classroom in the Masai Mara region of Kenya and supplied the books required by the state's curriculum. The Los Altos Rotary club helped rebuild a school that was damaged by the terrible earthquake in Aceh, Indonesia. Rotary Clubs of Palo Alto, Belmont, San Ramon have contributed \$13,000 to the Save a Girl Sewing Center, which enables thousands of local girls to stay in school.

TGUP has built 270 low cost, small scale, high impact infrastructure projects in some of the poorest countries in the world, which are expected to improve the lives of over 2 million people.

Because TGUP's operations are covered by grants, every dollar (\$1.09, actually) that is donated goes toward projects. According to

Mr. Freeman, with 1,200,000 Rotarians in the world, for \$10/year each we can build 1,000 classrooms a year. These small projects really do have the power to change the trajectory of many people's lives. TGUP has adopted as its motto a Bantu saying that Mr. Freeman learned from a Kenyan elder: "Even the greatest waterfall starts with a drop of water."

Questions:

During the question and answer period, Mr. Freeman explained how projects are formed, by (1) raising the funds and (2) finding the projects. The program always goes with people who are known and recommended.

BRUCE GEE was so inspired by TGUP's work that he offered to make a generous donation to the program on behalf of all Palo Alto Rotarians. Many other Rotarians also expressed their desire to donate.
