DENNIS MCGINN, a member for 21 years

Via Zoom, DENNIS shared how his career with Hewlett Packard impacted his life. He worked at HP for 21 years in 13 positions, doing whatever needed to be done, starting from the bottom as a staff engineer and gradually working his way up the ranks to running a division. Along the way, he became very involved with the automobile industry. DENNIS valued the "management by objective" culture of HP, but tired of the company after it evolved to meeting culture. After working for a series of companies, he returned to the automotive industry, where people were familiar with him. That led to him founding Rapid Recon, which was a huge success. The company manages and reconditions cars to get them ready to sell. DENNIS says his life has been great, and he's very fortunate to have had really good role models. He's still a techie at heart and likes his gadgets.

KEVIN CURRY, a member of PARC for 17 years, but a Rotarian for 45 years.

KEVIN began his talk by ripping up his prepared remarks which were based on the Four Way Test, which was discussed earlier in the meeting. He then went on to discuss his Silicon Valley career. In business, KEVIN is

known as the guy who created the video wall – the wall comprised of the cubes that you



see on news. The company he ran, Electrosonic, grew at over 32% per year the years he led it. KEVIN was born on July 4, 1937. His brother was born on the same day in 1935. He grew up in Kalamazoo, Michigan, and attended 7 different schools between 6th grade

and 12th grade. The family moved frequently because his father invested in different businesses. KEVIN attended the Univ of Minnesota, and Carleton College, then obtained an MBA, after which he was hired by 3M, which KEVIN says was a company that operated with tremendous integrity. After university, KEVIN served in the Coast Guard as an officer (for a short while), but was discharged after it was discovered that he was colorblind. After the Coast Guard, he joined 3M marketing, and worked for 3M for 22 years before moving to work for another company where he developed the idea of the video wall. KEVIN feels lucky to have invested in real estate, since his brother was a realtor, and to have built 5 houses, all of which are still standing. KEVIN is glad to be here in Palo Alto, a great part of the world.
