TODAY'S PROGRAM

BETSY BECHTEL introduced Dr. Brady Page, Infectious Disease and Critical Care Medicine at Stanford and San Diego, speaking on "Fighting Infection Disaster: The Story of Polio." He began his presentation by acknowledging Rotary International's early efforts to tackle and eradicate polio across the world.



Polio is a disease caused by a virus that infects the intestinal tract. Before it was controlled with vaccines, it caused flu-like symptoms for most patients but entered the central nervous system in about 1% of all cases. Because the virus circulated widely in unsanitary conditions, many people were immune to it. Improved sanitation and hygiene in the 18th century resulted in individuals encountering the virus for the first time when they had no immunity to prepare them for it. The first academic account of the disease was published in 1799.

The first polio vaccine was developed by Jonas Salk and introduced in 1953, making use of dead viruses and requiring injections. The oral vaccine developed by Albert Sabin and introduced in 1961 was based on live viruses that had been weakened. By 1970, there were only 12 cases of polio reported in the United States. In 1980, polio remained a public health problem primarily in areas like Brazil, Egypt, Sudan, India, and China. The Global Polio Eradication Initiative organized in 1985 enlisted the help of Rotary International and other organizations in raising \$15 billion to fight polio in the 100 countries in which it was still endemic at that time. By 2016, polio was still endemic in only four countries, Nigeria, Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Laos.

Tragically, the fight against polio has faced setbacks in the last fifteen years. Most new cases of polio are in conflict areas like the borders of Afghanistan and Pakistan, and most are not "wild polio" but mutations that have arisen in vaccinated populations. Dr. Page explained this problem very roughly as follows: The Sabin vaccine makes use of weakened but active virus; it's a "feature" of the Sabin vaccine that individuals who have been treated with it in effect vaccinate their families and neighbors through everyday bodily functions and behaviors that expose other people to traces of the virus. If the weakened virus that circulates in this way mutates in a healthy population in which most people have been deliberately vaccinated, no harm is done, but the mutation can spread and cause polio in weak populations; hence, new cases based on the mutation in this way are "vaccine derived."

As polio is eradicated, the diseases that we will have to worry about include Marburg virus (MARV), monkey pox and bird flu. Since most of these diseases reach humans from animals, we should be concerned that cutting down forests and destroying other animal habitats will bring more animals that carry disease into contact with human populations.
