Kyle's topic:
"Persuading



and being Persuaded: Insights from Speech & Debate."

Kyle is entering his second year as Program Director for debate at Paly. At Yale, he was second place Novice of The Year in the American Parliamentary Debate Association (APDA) as well as North American (NorthAms) Champion in 2017. Kyle previously coached at St. Luke's School, The Spence School, and Sidwell Friends. He is serving as president of the National Parliamentary Debate League (NPDL) and VP of the California Coast Forensic League (CFL).

Kyle began by saying that he felt close to Rotary from his experience in RYLA, the

Kyle noted that in our time, more and more people are writing and rewriting history without much in the way of quality control. There are strong incentives to spread false beliefs that appeal to what Kyle called "the reptilian parts of our brains." Honing the skills needed for debate helps students parse through information and evidence; it's a skill that can be taught and learned. Still, we're in an age when holding certain false beliefs can be a "tribal badge of honor."

It's a debater's job to adapt to different judges and audiences and to take account of listeners' interests and experiences. We're more inclined to be persuaded if we feel good about ourselves. Good debaters know that it's hard to win agreement when people sense you're out to prove them wrong.

Kyle suggested that, just as we want to be persuasive, we should learn to be persuadable. We should know what our values are, and hold onto them, but we should be willing to re-examine our beliefs. As Kyle put it, we need to improve our "belief formation software..." Q&A: What if someone just won't accept the results of the last election? Sometimes, said Kyle, you argue for the benefit of other listeners and not for the person whom you're debating.
