TODAY'S PROGRAM

DIANA DIAMOND introduced Professor Larry Diamond (no relation) Senior fellow at the Hoover

Institution and at the Freeman Spogli Institute for International Studies (FSI) who gave an enlightened talk on the decline of

enlightened talk on the decline of freedom and democracy in the world. Authoritarian



governments control Russia, Iran, and China; it's worrisome that there's less freedom in countries like India, Mexico, and South Africa. Even Israel, the UK and some members of the European Union have been facing a loss of democracy. According to Professor Diamond, the world has been in a "global democratic"

recession" since 2006-2007. Leaders have been abusing power, often embracing "authoritarian populism."

We can think of governments in four categories: There are full democracies, with meaningful elections and complete freedom of expression; countries where leaders may be chosen democratically but the government is ineffective because of corruption; nominal democracies ruled by authoritarian strongmen; and outright dictatorships. Not long ago, 53% of countries with populations of one million or more were fully democratic; now, just 43% are. Bangladesh, Hungary and Turkey are examples of rule by "authoritarian" strongmen." As Professor Diamond put it, a president is elected, "then everybody else has to shut up." According to Diamond, authoritarian populists discourage pluralism and have contempt for elite institutions. To resist them, citizens can create a "big tent" that encourages legitimate debate on bread and butter issues.

In the Question & Answer phase, Professor Diamond noted that India, South Africa, Mexico and the US will soon have national elections and Rishi Sunak is likely to call for an election in the UK this fall.... Two-thirds of Africans say in polls that they want regular, free and fair elections.... We have "very little leverage" in dealing with Venezuela because of its wealth from oil. Dealing with Venezuelan refugees has become a real problem for countries like Chile.... Diamond recommends that we consider the mechanism for elections recently adopted in Alaska where there's an open primary and the top four candidates advance to a general election in which the winner is determined by ranked choice voting. (In a ranked choice system, each voter lists candidates in order of preference. If no candidate receives a majority based on first-choice votes, the candidate with the least support is eliminated, and the second-choice votes of those who preferred that candidate are then redistributed.

Professor Diamond's conclusion: **Don't fret.**Over the past 250 years democracy has ebbed and flowed like the tide and we may see a reversal of these troublesome trends in the

future. We can help by encouraging open political discussions.
