## **TODAY'S PROGRAM**

BRUCE GEE introduced today's program, the



recognition of our Rotary Club Grant recipients. \$70K funds were given to 11 local

organizations serving our community. Today's program is a bit like Rotary speed dating as each group has a few minutes to talk about their mission and work in the community. BRUCE also thanked the numerous grant committee volunteers who have ensured that the donations are well stewarded by conducting a very diligent review of each application.

## Canopy

JP Renaud, Executive Director stated Canopy's mission is to protect and enhance the urban forest. In addition, Canopy also builds community by relying on volunteers to plant and maintain our urban forest. The grant was used to provide additional bags and carts which enabled Canopy to plant many more trees.

# **Children's Health Council (CHC)**

Lori McGilpin gave an overview of CHC and announced its new location in East Palo Alto near the Home Depot. The organization was



founded in 1953 by Physician Esther Clark. In the last 10 years the CHC has expanded into East Palo Alto and Menlo Park. The Rotary grant

enabled CHC to expand parent education programs which are important prevention of childhood distress.

## **Christmas Bureau**

Arne Lim, a recently retired teacher at Palo



Alto High School and Christmas Bureau volunteer, gave a history of the organization. It was started in the 1950's by Palo Alto School District nurses who organized gift distribution to needy families. Today the bureau distributes grants to families in the holiday season to use as they see fit. The

bureau's grants are used by families to enhance the holiday season including holiday meals and basic life necessities. The bureau runs on volunteers so their overhead is very low at 2%. The bureau is expanding to serve elderly and the homeless.

# Downtown Streets Team (DST)

Chris Richardson and Erika Laguna

represented DST providing an overview of DST which was founded on the principle of ending homelessness through the dignity of work. DST is now in 20 cities throughout the state. DST recently took over the food closet at



All Saints Church which serves over 300 people. The food closet is largely staffed by volunteers and they are always looking for more help. The grant enabled DST to fill in gaps missing from food donated by the public.

#### East Palo Alto Kids Foundation (EPAK)

Rebecca Lowell and Kendra Muscarella, board members described EPAK's mission to support East Palo Alto teachers by issuing microgrants

enabling them to purchase needed supplies and educational materials. They provided 490 grants which ended up supporting thousands of students. The grant provided resources to host parent/community events to increase



the family involvement with education.

# Ecumenical Hunger Program (EHP)

Ellen Izuka described EHP's history by stating the organization was founded in 1975 to provide food, clothing and furniture to needy families. They also work closely with other agencies by providing referrals for services they don't provide. EHP is the



largest emergency food provider in East Palo Alto and Menlo Park. They distribute 33K food boxes to 15K individuals. They are expanding to support other family needs such as rent assistance. The grant provided snacks and lunches for children.

#### Razorhawks

Alexander Matthew Key represented the Razorhawks, a youth rugby league. The organization was founded



in 1981 and serves youth between the ages of 8 to 18. Rugby is a diverse sport played by many cultures including Pacific Islanders. The Razorhawks provide a safe environment for different communities to gather. The grant provided scholarships and transportation support to enable more youth to participate.

#### **Marine Science Institute**

Marilou Seiff said the Institute was founded in 1970 to provide youth the opportunity to have direct contact with the Bay environment.



Over 50K students participate in their programs each year. The Rotary grant enabled bringing hands-on instructional programs to 8 East Palo Alto schools.

## Museum of American Heritage (MOAH)



Michelle Fabian representing MOAH gave an overview. The museum was founded in 1985 and opened the museum in 1990 when it took over the

Williams House bequeathed to the City by the Williams sisters. The museum curates technical and mechanical artifacts in use before the advent of computers. The grant enabled MOAH to revitalize the heritage garden.

## Palo Alto Community Child Care (PACCC)

Melissa Roth presented on behalf of PACCC which was founded 50 years ago and provides child care from infancy to 5<sup>th</sup>



grade. They serve 775 kids daily and provide year-round service. The grant provided an increased number of scholarships for the underserved in our community.

## **Project WeHope**

Natalie Walker thanked the club for its grant



which enabled them to purchase additional washers and dryers for the Dignity on Wheels vehicle. Project WeHope was founded in 1999 and provides homeless support as well as operates a 73 bed shelter. They now serve 5 counties and 22 cities and are currently expanding the shelter

to 106 beds.
