Abigail Adams wrote to her husband John in 1776, “I long to hear that you have

declared an independency. And, by the way, in the new code of laws which I suppose it will be necessary for you to make, I desire you would remember the ladies and be more generous and favorable to them than your ancestors.” However, that “generous and favorable” treatment did not follow quickly. The 15th Amendment to the Constitution in 1870 provided that voting rights cannot be denied on the basis of “race, color, or previous condition of servitude,” but said nothing about denial of the right to vote based on gender. Fifty years later, the 19th Amendment decreed that voting rights cannot be denied on the basis of sex, but said nothing about other laws and practices that deny equality for women. An Equal Rights Amendment approved by Congress in 1972 is not part of the Constitution today because an insufficient number of states had accepted it by 1982, the deadline set for ratification. A cigarette ad in 1968 told women, “You’ve come a long way, baby,” but we can still ask whether we’ve come far enough.

TODAY'S PROGRAM

MIKE REYNOLDS

introduced the day's speaker, **Desiree Lyon, CEO of Namaste Direct**, who joined us via Zoom to share information about her organization as a World Community Service project. She saluted our club as "valuable thought partners" as well as partners in raising funds. She explained that Namaste Direct is a "small, scrappy NGO" duly registered in Guatemala whose mission is to empower women to pursue their dreams. It's not only women who benefit; it has been proven that bringing women into a society's economic life means a much improved chance of breaking generational patterns of poverty.



The work of Namaste Direct began with a microloan program, but loans are now just one element of the services and activities that it makes available. Strategic alliances with other organizations address reproductive health, education and legal support

As an example of the progress that can be achieved, **Desiree** told us about a woman named Olga, who had received only a fourth-grade level education.

She came to Namaste Direct with no assets in her own name. She used a Namaste loan to buy a grinding machine that she uses in preparing and selling coffee, chocolate and spices. She is one of 5,000 women who have benefited from Namaste's help.... Participants in Namaste's programs are matched with business advisers, encouraged to develop formal business plans, and provided with coaching and workshops on needed skills and techniques.... A more recent program, an alternative to microloans, is called "Cuchubal," a savings club. Each month, a different woman receives a share of the group's savings, matched by Namaste.
