described the many

Baer in 2011. This brought him into his current interest in facilities and commercial real estate. To his credit, Jon has also had a hand in changing State laws and acting as an expert witness. Currently, he is interested in community service and working with nonprofits. When asked by **HENRIETTA BURROUGHS** what advice he would give the young, he responded by drawing attention to the need to recognize crossroads.



JACK CABARNESS

is the Pastor of the Covenant Presbyterian Church at 650 East Meadow. He moved here in 2022 with his wife and two adopted children. In the question time, he

was asked how these adoptions came about and he responded that it happened through being foster parents first. His parents were both highly respected educators. In his career JACK has been greatly influenced by teachers and he described meaningful interactions with several of them. JACK mentioned his own education path through Dartmouth College, Law School and Seminary. He closed by talking about being given advice by someone dying who drew attention to the value of holding up a mirror.

RENE MORGAN described her adventurous career. It started in the South Side of Chicago the daughter of a lawyer - businessman who



loved sports and an opera-loving mother. She studied literature and history at the University of Michigan which included a junior year in Florence, Italy. After graduation she got married to a dental student and obtained a teaching credential. Her husband's subsequent military draft career took her

to Paris for two years where she studied French language and literature at the Sorbonne. From there she went to living in Lincoln Nebraska and Denver Colorado, teaching English and having three children. Sadly, after 20 years her marriage ended in divorce. Poetry then became her interest before deciding to attend law school. This led to an internship with a US congressman in Washington where she met her second husband Don. Eventually she obtained a fellowship at the Supreme Court. Don's law career took them to Tokyo, Japan for four vears. There she taught American Constitutional Law and wrote a successful book summarizing important Supreme Court cases. After that she taught law in Washington DC, retired first to Boulder Colorado and then to Palo Alto to be closer to children and grandchildren. Her late husband Don was delighted to be a member of this Rotary Club and now so is she.
