Continuing the annual fundraising drive for The Rotary Foundation, **REBECCA GERALDI** gave an overview of the Foundation and thanked a list of names of those in our club who have already given. You can mail a check or donate online

STANS KLEIJNEN explained that our contributions to the Rotary Foundation has enabled our club to give grants to many projects: Namaste to empower 200 women in Guatemala; the Cuchubal match program for 36 women; water basins in two Guatemalan villages; bathrooms in Vietnam; migrant children in Thailand; and an eye hospital in India. And in our program today we will hear about Oliveseed and the work that our grant has supported with them.

PROGRAM

STANS KLEIJNEN

introduced our speaker, Barb Mackraz, who is the founder and Executive Director of Oliveseed, an organization that empowers youth, women, and communities



through literacy, education, water and sustainable livelihoods. Through our World Community Services grants program, our club has contributed small grants to Oliveseed for the past two years. They work in the Massai

region of Kenya and in rural Morocco. Our most recent grant was for sanitary kits for girls in Kenya to enable them to stav in school.

Barb Mackraz was inspired by seeing a

very small school in

rural Morocco in 2013 and she thought, "I bet I could make a difference here." She chose to start with a library for a school on the Algerian border of Morocco, Teachers all over the country then came to her, asking for the same at their schools. She set up English (at the teachers' request) libraries all over Morocco. One of the students from a small desert community just graduated from UCLA film school last year. Her father had wanted her to get married at age 13. Now she is at Columbia.

Having established libraries in desert regions all over Morocco, Oliveseed now focuses on sponsoring a national short story competition.

In 2017 Oliveseed expanded to focus on the Massai community of Kenya. Their families live in mud huts without power and light. Literacy is 13% for men and even less for women. Girls are often forced to marry young. Oliveseed sets up libraries in schools in their region - one library was built with the support of our club. Oliveseed has even built a little library inside a village, which is a circle of mud huts. They installed solar lighting and the room is full of students on a dark evening.

In 2025, at the initiation of Barb Mackaz, we became a Sister City with Narok, Kenya.

According to Nelson Mandela, the greatest weapon for changing the world is education. Barb believes that one other weapon is women, so she has turned her focus to empowering Massai women. These women have to walk to collect water each day, so Oliveseed has built water towers to store water close to their villages. This gives them more time for other activities. Oliveseed built a Women's center where they can learn marketable skills. One project is making girls' hygiene kits. The women earn money, and almost all of them use the money to keep their kids in school.

Looking ahead: In Morocco, her involvement is now only with the writing competition. In Kenya, she hopes to expand the Women's work center so that it will be a self-sustaining enterprise. To make that possible, they want to add more solar for sewing machines and electric cycles for deliveries.
