SPEAKER:



Hallie Woods is the Vice President of Operations for Medical Center for Aurora (MCA) and Spalding Rehabilitation Hospital (SRH). She is the person in charge of the Centennial Medical Plaza at Arapahoe Rd and Jordan Rd.

Hallie told the story and presented a video on Anthony's Hands. Anthony was a teenager who took his life. They took him into surgery with the remote chance the doctors might be able to save his life. They were not successful. However, one of the nurses had the idea of making a plaster cast of Anthony's hands along with his siblings and parents. The casting was successful and his family has a lasting remembrance.

MCA was established by the community for the community. They are a licensed 346 bed acute care facility, Level II trauma center, pediatric care facility, cardiac care facility, have oncology subspecialties, a surgical robotic center, 40 beds for rehabilitation, and 80 inpatient beds for psych care. 20 of the psych beds are for geriatric, 40 for adults, and 20 for children

MCA is going to add 40 more psych beds in 2019. They work with the Cherry Creek School District. They established a psychiatric resident program for this year.

MCA is a 5 star facility designated by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid. They are listed by US News and World Report a best hospital. They are a Leapfrog top hospital in 2016 and 2017.

The Centennial Medical Plaza (CMP) has one of the first free-standing emergency rooms in the state. In 2017, the ER had 12,700 emergency visits. They are a Level IV trauma center, they have stroke protocols, and chest pain protocols.

CMP offers specialties in primary care, orthopedics, endocrinology and endocrine surgery, colorectal surgery, ear nose and throat, OB/GYN, dentistry, and pediatric dentistry. They offer 24/7 ER care, pharmacy, outpatient imaging, women's imaging, outpatient surgery, infusion services, upper extremity joint replacement, and screening colonoscopies. They now offer 3D digital mammography (Tomosynthesis), lung cancer screening, calcium scores, x-ray (walk-in), cat scans, MRIs and ultrasound.
