- Allen Jackson, Sargent-at-Arms. Allen is charged with keeping our meetings organized and running smoothly.
- Samantha "Samurai" Johnston, President Elect. Samurai will be helping me carry out some of my duties as well as other activities in the club.
- John Berry, Past President. An invaluable resource for me as well as an enlightened voice on the board.
- Our Millennial Board Member is yet to be named. This person will be able to have a voice on the board to represent out Millennial members. I should have a name tomorrow night when I attend their meeting.

"A Centennial Rotary Minute" -

Henry "Hank" Henschen was a charter member of Centennial Rotary, serving the Club first as Treasurer for 3 years, during period when Barb Medina was on Board as President Elect, President and Immediate Past President. (The only years Barb would not be Treasurer). He would go on to serve as President 2009-2010. He was diagnosed with Bladder Cancer summer of 2007 and passed away July 30, 2011. In his Rotary Pin Collection, I found his President's Pin and donated to Centennial Rotary to become the Perpetual President's Pin, which is passed on annually to the new President. Hank was a pharmacist and Pharmacy Manager at Centennial Medical Plaza when he joined Centennial Rotary.

Members may not know that once a President becomes the Immediate Past President, they receive a new pin with dates served as President which they will wear from that day forward. Thus the President's Pin is no longer used - it just sets in a drawer no longer worn. Since Hank was the first deceased President of Centennial Rotary, I chose to donate his President's Pin, to be used continually each year, and I believe the first recipient was Marc Garfinkle.

U.S. women win World Cup

On July 10, 1999, the U.S. women's soccer team defeats China to win their second Women's World Cup. The game ended in a 5-4 shootout after 120 scoreless minutes: 90 tightly played minutes of regulation dictated by the United States and 30 tense minutes of overtime largely controlled by the Chinese. The title game was played at the Rose Bowl in southern California in front of 90,185 fans, the largest crowd ever to attend a women's sporting event.
