STUDENT OF THE MONTH



Drake Hampton is the student of the month from Arapahoe High School. He has a 4.126 average and is ranked 30th in a class of 527. He has been accepted to attend the Colorado School of Mines where he wants to study Biomedical Engineering with a pre-med degree or Petroleum Engineering. He feels the course of study is the best path to get into medical school. He wants to be either an anesthesiologist or interventional radiologist.

Drake has competed in 6 seasons of varsity athletics and 2 seasons of JV athletics. He also started the chess club at Arapahoe High School. He had to overcome time limits on being able to compete at the state level in swimming; he had to knock nearly 6 seconds off of his time. He did it and was able to compete in state competition. He also plays the piano and has been in 5 piano competitions where he has received superior ratings.

GUEST SPEAKER

The guest speaker was Kimberly Konczak from PREMA Corp. PREMA stands for Public Resource Management Alliance Corp. One of the major areas of their work for cities is finding hidden revenue through compliance. She gave the example of the City of Centennial. They were receiving half the revenue they felt they should be collected. PREMA Corp



found that many of the companies in the City of Centennial were registered in Aurora, Littleton, Englewood or not registered at all. By working with these companies and cities they were able to get revenue due to Centennial to come to Centennial.

The company was started by Kimberly's parents in 1999. Her father had been a city manager in several cities in Colorado, Alabama, Tennessee, and Georgia. After a newspaper published an unfavorable story about her father, he decided that was enough and started PREMA. Kimberly's mother is an accountant. The areas of focus for PREMA are

1. Finding hidden revenue through compliance,
2. Ordinance review and analysis,
3. Local government tax and license administration, and
4. Auditing.

Through the years they have collected over \$28 million in hidden revenue, recovered \$3 million in audits, and identified over 12,000 non-compliant businesses. They serve over 20 municipalities.

ON THIS DATE IN HISTORY

1789—Bill of Rights passes Congress

The first Congress of the United States approves 12 amendments to the U.S. Constitution, and sends them to the states for ratification. The amendments, known as the Bill of Rights, were designed to protect the basic rights of U.S. citizens, guaranteeing the freedom of speech, press, assembly, and exercise of religion; the right to fair legal procedure and to bear arms; and that powers not delegated to the federal government were reserved for the states and the people. Only 10 of the 12 amendments were adopted by the states. The 11th approved amendment was adopted by the states as the 27th amendment to the Constitution in 1992. It limited pay raises to members of Congress until the next election.
