
Grants Implemented in 2022-2023

DMHR District Grants 2022-2023

- What do you notice?
- The DMHR cash is a more than the allocation from the Club Foundation for the year. It includes cash donated by members of the Club.
- There were other Clubs' contributions
- TRF funds for District Grants are in the form of DDF (District Designated Funds) transferred from TRF to the District. Contributions from District members to TRF 3 years earlier are the sources of DDF
- Bottom line: The ratio of DMHR cash to Total funds is almost 5 to 1

DMHR Global Grants 2022-2023

Things to Know

- The DMHR cash is more twice the annual allocation for the year. These amounts were allocated over a 2-year period. The total also includes some cash donated by Club members
- 27 District Clubs supported these 3 Grants
- 6 Clubs supported all 3 Grants
- 8 Clubs from outside the District supported one of these grants
- A few Clubs outside the District contributed DDF from their District.

The ratio of DMHR cash to total funds is over 10 ½ to 1!!!!!!!!!!

DMHR Global Grants 2022-2023

The ratio of DMHR cash to Total funds is over $10 \frac{1}{2}$ to 1. Why? The supporting Clubs trust us to present high quality Grants for for support.


- Committed project champions



UGANDA'S MENTAL STRUGGLE

Over 1/3 of Ugandans suffer from mental illness, while 5-10% have access to services.

There are **50 psychiatrists** for the entire country of Uganda.

The center of our efforts has been the Agago District in northern Uganda.



AGAGO'S MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS

Legacy of trauma struggles resulting in deep intergenerational trauma

The year the war ended, northern Uganda had the highest rate of PTSD and depression ever recorded among displaced and conflict-affected populations anywhere

Mental health remains unserved.

GRANT-ENABLED INTEGRATION

Training CHWs

We provide comprehensive training programs to equip CHWs with the necessary knowledge and skills to deliver effective counseling

Collaborating

We aim to advocate for the integration of mental healthcare within primary care services, leading to a more comprehensive approach to healthcare delivery.



Using stepped care

A progressive and personalized method that allows for a more efficient allocation of resources and ensures that the individuals receive the proper level of care


Health facilities

We ensure that individuals can access support more conveniently and without stigma. In addition, this allows for better coordination and collaboration.

Awareness events

These campaigns aim to educate the community about mental health conditions, promote understanding, and encourage help-seeking behavior.

STEPPED CARE INTERVENTION



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ECONOMIC UPLIFT

Finemind partnered with the Whitaker Peace & Development Initiative and Street Business School to upskill 100 young mothers.

With an average household size of approximately five persons in Uganda, our endeavors have indirectly touched the lives of an estimated 400 individuals.

A baseline survey revealed that the women aspired to establish individual businesses. Currently, they are managing stalls at community markets and utilizing the verandas of others' shops and homes for their operations. They sell common food items such as salt, sugar, soap, and vegetables. Additionally, smaller groups among them are operating a retail shop and a hair salon.



GRANT IMPACT

Our collective efforts yielded the following results

- Trained 10 new clinicians to provide quality mental health services
- Benefited 18 health facilities to add mental health servicing
- Provided a remarkable 2,977 counseling sessions
- Offered solace and support to 1,535 individuals
- Treated an astonishing 625 individuals
- Broke down barriers of mental health via 24 health educational campaigns
- Invested in the economic empowerment of 100 young mothers
- **Touched** the lives of 400 individuals

Refurbishing a dormant library that service a large rural area in Zimbabwe

- Complete renovation of the interior of the building
- Donations of large quantities of new and used books
- Catalogued all books
- New furniture
- Water tower added
- Library management software
- Librarians hired and funded
- Operating funds from adult membership payments



- Estimated 12,000 users in the adjacent communities
- Serves 5 previously unserved Council and independent Schools, with
 - No libraries
 - No classroom books
- \$10,000 budget
- \$3,000 funding from DMHR Foundation
- \$7,000 from other Clubs and District
- 8 Harare Central Rotarians participated
- More than 200 service hours
- Partnership with Harare Central Rotary Club
- Long standing relationship between Host Club and DMHR
