Denver Mile High Rotary Upcoming Programs

January 17th — Timothy Standring is the Gates Family Foundation Curator at the Denver Art Museum. Since he began at the Denver Art Museum in 1989, Standring has led a significant initiative to make art and art history accessible to a broader public and has served the museum in many capacities. Dr. Standring will discuss what it takes to organize major exhibitions at the Denver Art Museum with particular reference to two shows opening for Denver in 2018: Degas: A Passion for Perfection, and Rembrandt: Painter as Printmaker.

January 24th — Brandon Johnson is the Director of Programs with Bridges to Prosperity, an organization that provides isolated communities with access to essential health care, education and economic opportunities by building footbridges over impassable rivers. The presentation will be an overview of Bridges to Prosperity's work and relationship with Rotary.

January 31st — Mark Rudolph is the State of Colorado Superfund Project Manager for the Bonita Peaks Superfund Site near Silverton. Mark will provide updates on the Gold King Mine remedial work as well as the other 47 listed mine sites in the Bonita Peak Superfund location. Work has been accelerating on the Bonita Peak Superfund site but has many years ahead. Mark will discuss current site actions at the Bonita Peak Site and other similar sites in the San Juan Mountains.

SURE-SHOT - \$52 ADULTS, \$45 CHILD

Rafting on Clear Creek River's mountain water is an experience that's fun for the whole family. Get ready for some fun on our exciting 'Sure Shot' beginner-rafting trip. Begin with passing by the historic Charlie Taylor Water Wheel experiencing Class II rapids (ripples). While rafting through Historic Idaho Springs the Class III rapids of Castle Falls and Argo Holes test your newly developed rafting skills. Below town history and nature abound, with the occasional sighting of Retail Hawk, Deer, Fox, Bob Cat, Lynx, Elk, and Big Horn Sheep. Dizzy Lizzy, Power Line, Mountain Lion, and Box prepare us for the grand finale of Mr. Twister! The perfect beginner - starting with Class II water so you can practice, and then the Class III rapids. There is a 50 pound minimum for rafting to insure proper fit of the life jacket. Allow 3 hours for the trip.

BLAST (INTERMEDIATE HALF DAY) - \$62 ADULTS

Perhaps you've already been there and done that, and are looking for something more. Most folks who paddle the Blast weren't expecting some of Colorado's most consistent whitewater, and come back for more! With five solid class IV rapids and more class three whitewater than we have space to mention, the Blast is waiting for those with good physical conditioning and an attitude for adventure. If you are active in your daily life the 'Blast' is the trip for you. Allow 3 hours for the trip. Minimum age 14.

KAMIKAZE (ADVANCED HALF DAY) - \$82 ADULTS

One of our former guests refers to this trip as "the best darn whitewater around!", and after braving the rapids of the Kamikaze trip you'll understand why. Add another two miles of continuous (and we aren't kidding!) class IV/III whitewater onto the Blast and you have an adventure that will bring you back over and over. If you're on your toes you might have time to enjoy the scenery of the Front Range before you dive into your next rapid. Previous experience and the ability to swim is highly recommended. Allow 3 hours for the trip. Minimum age 14.

William Charles Jensen


October 1936 - December 2017

Bill Jensen joined the Rotary Club of Denver Mile High in August 2002. He was a gentle man and a quiet member, which belied his very successful career. In 2005 Bill created the DMH Rotary Club Book Club that continues to this day, with both Rotarians and non-Rotarians sharing books and ideas. Bill was a member of Denver Mile High Rotary until 2015, when he terminated due to his health. We remember him fondly.

William (Bill) Jensen was born in Billings, Montana in October 1936 to Lloyd and Cleo Jensen. The oldest of three siblings, he attended East High School in Denver. He received an AB in English from Cornell University in 1959 and a law degree, cum laude, from the University of Denver in 1961. Upon graduation he joined the firm of Ireland Stapleton, where he became a partner and began a long and successful career as a commercial real estate and public finance attorney in Denver. In 1982 he co-founded Jensen, Byrne, Parsons & Ruh. In 1993 he became a partner with Moye White where he practiced until 2015. He was nationally recognized as a real estate lawyer and served on a number of community boards and commissions. He died peacefully at the Aspen Siesta nursing home after a long battle with dementia. Bill loved the outdoors, fishing and the Broncos and was devoted to his family. He is survived by his long-time companion Christine (Chris) Sperry, his sister Kirstin, his two sons Eric and Kirk and their spouses Tibi and Kate, four grandchildren - Cassidy, Samantha, Annika and Zoe - and many nieces and nephews. His brother Philip predeceased him. A **celebration of Bill's life will be held at 1pm on February 24, 2018 at The Denver Botanic Gardens.**
