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A bit more about Knight Moves

Q: How long has Knight Moves been educating software developers?

A: Between the company who championed this program (Pillar Technology – where I was the COO) and Knight Moves – 9 years. Knight Moves started as a nonprofit and converted this year to an Exclusive for Benefit Corporation (XB Corp).

Q: How many students have gone through the program so far? Each year?

A: Overall, 70+. Only one has finished the program in Knight Moves because a state gave us a grant to have someone go full-time (paid us to train and paid them \$15/hr to receive the training). That individual went from stocking shelves at Walmart to making \$60,000/yr and a great career. It takes 3 years for someone to complete the standard program, so we won't see grads until 2024/25. Our goal is to raise the funds over the next year to produce an average of 50 grads a month. We could easily develop and place 100 grads/mo. if the right philanthropist/charitable organization was funding – and then be self-sustainable to produce 100 grads/mo ongoing. A typical 4-year public college produces 40-50 computer science graduates/year.

Q: I noticed Belonging on one of the slides, can you tell me more about how Knight Moves team focuses on belonging?

A: A key aspect for a person to feel like they Belong, is for the team they are joining to Accept them. When a person joins a team and can't be productive without extensive time from team members to train them it creates a backlash from the team. I've experienced this scenario for decades. Team members are already assigned more tech work than they can do, then they get an assignment to train someone. I reviewed such a program last week and the training company was clear to point out that 80% of the overall training would come on the job. What happens in IT shops is individuals go through these programs, get hired — with great excitement for their future, join a team without the dedicated resources to train them, the person doesn't feel like they Belong, and doesn't advance in their career. Company after company data shows they hire people through these low-quality training programs then don't advance unless they invest heavily in diverting their senior resources to train. Knight Moves graduates join the team being productive their first week on the job.
