In your 4th year as a Club Member, you may be asked to:

- Serve as President-Elect or President Nominee
- Oversee a Service Project that you have a passion for
- Continue to attract new Members & develop the club

In your 3rd year as a Club Member, you may be asked to:

- Serve as a Board Member or committee chair (attend monthly 1 hour Board meetings).
- Serve as Treasurer, Secretary,
- Organize and lead a Service Project that you have a passion for.
- Volunteer for a District led event (PELs, Training)
- Lead a community event to attract prospects

In your 2nd year as a Club Member, you may be asked to:

- Serve on a Committee
- Assist with a fundraiser
- Offer up a service project or assist with a project .
- Organize (your passion) a club social in our community.
- Attend district membership events

Service/Fellowship: Join in as your schedule/talent/gifts allows.
 Opportunities include:

- Volunteer at a service project a qtr
 - Loan Closet
 - Active Adults
 - Events listed on calendar
- Attend a club social and a committee meeting.
- Volunteer at another club's event or attend District training.
- Donate to Polio/The Rotary Foundation \$25/yr

In your 4th year as a Club Member, in addition to previous year duties, you may be asked to:

- Mentor other Rotary members
- Provide new ways of energizing/ "livening up" the meeting.

In your 3rd year, in addition to 1 & 2 year duties, you may be asked to:

- On occasion, fill in for the President during his/her absence
- Help to provide admin support/fill in the gaps as needed
- Mentor other Rotarians

In addition to 1st year duties, you may be asked to:

- Take a more active role in the meetings
 - Provide a speaker
 - Assist Secretary, Treasurer, President in an ongoing task.
- Be a Rotary buddy for a new member
- Invite prospective member to join Rotary
- Take or attend RI online training

As a Rotary Club Member, Explore and experience Rotary by:

- Attending meetings and
 - Lead in the 4-Way Test
 - Sharing a thought for the day
 - Gather up "Happy Bucks"
 - Be a greeter
- Bring guests to a meeting/event
- Complete New Member training
 - Club Orientation
 - RI New Member Training
- Visit another club
- Meet with your Rotary mentor qtrly
