Sergeant's Session: Michael Bromby

Drawing on his past school boy humour and noting that Mary's earlier presentation included some

quotations by Dickens, Michael bought the house down with an 'innocent' Freudian slip when he gave his version of the title "A Tale of Two Cities". He then proceeded to play a piece from Pietro Mascagni's "Cavalleria Rusticana", a favourite of Roy Garrett. Roy noted that his early family life was full of classical music and he too had come to enjoy good music. The piece played was also chosen for Roy and Annie's wedding.

Guest Speaker: Rev. Dr Simon Holt, Senior Minister, Collins Street Baptist Church

"The Good City: Reflections on the City as Community" Simon commenced by noting the Collins Street Baptist church has been a microcosm of Melbourne city throughout the churches 170 years history. This time span has seen the city's inhabitants evolve through several cycles, each requiring varying reactions from the church.

In the pre 1900 days many people, in relative terms, lived in the city and the church was a centre point where the congregation walked to services and seats at services were often by ticket such was the popularity of religion and the services. The drift of people to suburbs through the early twentieth century brought a rapid decline in numbers of city dwellers and thus the size of the congregation. That trend has been reversed in recent times and the city once again is home to many people – estimated at 60,000 currently, growing steadily and with changing needs and ideology from previous days.

The challenge now is to identify the new inhabitants and for the church to remain relevant. Not all city inhabitants are well to do and live in the glass towers; the church seeks to be inclusive of all.

Simon thinks of the church as a home – at the back door there is Baptist Place, a locality of drug users and the homeless. He said the heroin users tend to be replaced now by people with mental health issues. The church employs 30 social workers and they run a basement "Freedom Cafe" at the back door which supplies 50-60 persons on a regular basis.

At the front door they host exhibitions, food and wine functions etc., and operate the Verandah Cafe, which fits well amongst the previous neighbours "Georges" and the designer label stores that inhabit that section of Collins Street.

"But their purpose is not about running cafes, it is more about hospitality and all are welcome."

In question time Simon noted that many of the city inhabitants in the vicinity are students from SE Asia often in Melbourne for only 3-4 years and during that time with very limited contact with Australians. Their personal issues are often not known as they are outside the system – contact is promoted by chaplains at the learning institutions.

Roy thanked Simon for his presentation and presented him with the usual token of the club's appreciation. President Kay closed the meeting.
