Tony Walker: Policy Challenges Arising from Research into Alcoholfuelled Violence

Alcohol's devastating impact on children and families has been revealed in a new report titled: The Hidden harm. This report, commissioned by the Foundation for Alcohol Research and Education, includes the most comprehensive findings to date on alcohol-related family and domestic violence in Australia.



Alcohol is involved in up to two of every three domestic violence incidents and as many as half of all child-protection cases, depending on the State or Territory.

As the evidence mounts of the extent of alcohol harm in Australia and the many sound and proven strategies for addressing those harms, it is now time for governments to act.

Tony is a Director of the Foundation for Alcohol Research and Education, an independent, not-for-profit organisation working to stop the harm caused by alcohol. In his full-time role, Tony is the International Editor of the Australian Financial Review [AFR]. He is a former

Middle East Correspondent for the Financial Times. Tony has served as the AFR's Political Editor and recently completed a long assignment as Washington Correspondent. He is a dual Walkley Award winner for commentary and co-author of Arafat: The Biography, first published by WH Allen.


