

for suspicious deaths, deaths in police custody or in recent police presence, police shootings resulting in a fatality and suspicious disappearances (possible homicides). How does Crime Command operate and investigate these matters whilst working with and advising regional police?

The Missing Person Squad has recently been relocated separate from the Homicide Squad. Management have identified a deficiency in providing timely and accurate information to key stakeholders regarding missing persons and relating processes. Using the combined experience of Rotary and the leadership mentoring program Victoria Police is primed ready for a new website to address these deficiencies.

Detective Senior Sergeant Stuart Bailey has been a police officer for 28 years working in a variety of uniform, investigative and forensic fields. His work has taken him interstate and overseas to such places as Indonesia for Operation Alliance for the 2002 Bali Bombings, involved corruption investigations, high profile homicide investigations, such as the murder of police officers Silk & Miller, and gangland figure Carl Williams. In his current role as a manager at the Homicide Squad he with other managers, oversees around 70 homicides per annum.

Molly O'Shaughnessy. General Manager Operations Safe steps - ABOUT FAMILY VIOLENCE.



Despite being so early in the morning after the Easter break, Molly delivered one of the most erudite presentations on her commitment to the problem of family violence and the program of SAFE STEPS. SAFE STEPS is a 24/7 operation that commenced in 1973 and offers protection, connection with support.

1973 and offers protection, connection with support, advocacy, referral to safe and secure accommodation for those suffering family violence.

Violence follows a path of coercive control, chronic onset and repetitive patterns, and is the leading cause of ill health and death in the 15 to 44 year age group. FAMILY VIOLENCE PROTECTION ACT 2008 (VIC) defines

family violence as occurring with spouse, domestic partner, relationship partner, relative, parent, carer, other person single or multiple.

STATISTICS ON SAFE STEPS ACTIVITIES 55,000 calls in 2014-15

7,500 Clients continuing in same period

Over 50% were young children (25% of which were boys).

- b. FAMILY VIOLENCE ONLY EFFECTS SOME COMMUNITIES.

Born from humble beginnings in the backyard on Henry Street, this tiny artisan microbrewery pride themselves in handcrafting exquisite beers and ales. Created using the finest ingredients, a lot of passion and hard work.

As well as the opportunity to taste a range of craft brews, the event will feature an auction of fine wines and a talk by Sandra de Pury, winemaker at Yeringberg Wines, who has also donated some notable wines for the event.

Sandra, along with her father Guill de Pury and wife Katherine make wines for the new millennium from the low-yielding vines re-established in the heart of what was one of the most famous vineyards of the 19th century. In the riper years, the red wines have a velvety generosity of flavour rarely encountered, while never losing varietal character; the long-lived Marsanne Roussanne takes students of history back to Yeringberg's fame in the 19th century. They export to the US, Switzerland, Hong Kong and China.

RCCMS members have raided their cellars to present a range of interesting wines for the special silent auction and the highlight auction on the evening.

Attendance is strictly limited to 40 people. Finger-food and vouchers for tastings or wine, beer and soft drink by the glass are included in the ticket price OF \$65. Further drinks can be purchased at the bar.


Also a lucky door prize will be awarded at no cost.


