#### RCCMS Paul Harris Breakfast - Wednesday November 13

Our 21st Rotary Foundation Paul Harris Breakfast has secured Justice Chris Maxwell as speaker. He is Judge of the Supreme Court of Victoria and President of the Court of Appeal. He will talk on "Reflections on Victoria's Human Rights Charter - Has It Made a Difference?"

The Charter has been in force nearly six years. J. Maxwell will offer views on its impact in Victoria. He will look into legal consequences and cultural changes that it has brought about, including within government. This is a great opportunity to hear important and stimulating views from a top authority.

Justice Maxwell graduated from Melbourne University in 1975. He was the 1975 Rhodes Scholar for Victoria and in 1977 completed a B.Phil at New College, Oxford.

On his return to Australia, Chris practised as a solicitor and barrister and was appointed Queen's Counsel in 1998. In 1994 Chris was counsel assisting the Judicial Inquiry into the Australian Secret Intelligence Service.

Between 2000 and 2002, Chris was President of the Victorian Council of Civil Liberties. In 2003-04 he undertook a review for the Victorian Government of the Occupational Health and Safety Act 1985. In July 2005 Christ was appointed President of the Court of Appeal, Supreme Court of Victoria. The Charter of Human Rights and Responsibilities Act 2006 is a Victorian law that sets out the basic

rights, freedoms and responsibilities of all people in Victoria. The Charter requires those delivering public services to act consistently with twenty fundamental human rights.

The Charter has now been in force nearly six years. Justice Maxwell will offer some reflections on its impact in Victoria, addressing both the legal consequences of the Charter and the cultural changes that it has brought about within government. He will also discuss the role of the Courts under the Charter and whether deciding human rights questions is an appropriate function for the judiciary.

The Paul Harris Breakfast celebrates Paul Harris Fellow Recognition recipients in Rotary District 9800. All Paul Harris Breakfast proceeds go toward Rotary Foundation programmes.

The Australian newpaper gave Rotary some national publicity in Saturday's issue November 9. It was in their front-page story "Bikies Inc: how a police sting revealed clubs' bid to amass a legal warchest", which spilled to page 8.

There one reads: "Watson [a brutal member of the Finks club] also boasted of what had happened to an ex-girlfriend who 'pissed' him off: he hacked off her hair and kicked her in the head.

The Finks are part crime business, part Animal House fraternity and part Rotary Club Chapter, run to stringent rules enforced byy the sergeant-at-arms, a kind of first among equals. There is no president; full or patched members vote at meetings where minutes are taken by the club secretary.

Detective Inspector Garry Watts, the operations manager of the Queensland Police Service's Taskforce Hydra, which goes after bikies, suggests it is not so much democracy as anarchy...the club treasurer also manages the 'dues' levied on members..."

#### Announcements:

- Paul Harris Breakfast On Wednesday 13 November 2013. Kay Stevens promoted this special event. Bookings can be made online.
- Kay Stevens announced that our Sister Club, the merged RC Osaka Midosuji Hommachi, had recently written to us, thanking us for our congratulatory video of May 2013. Many of their members are intending to go to the Rotary International Conference in Sydney, June 2014. Included with the letter was their new Club banner.
- Community Village Neil Salvano thanked members in advance for their volunteering to assist next Saturday night, post Derby day. He also asked that members consider volunteering for any one or more Friday or Saturday nights over 4 weekends commencing Friday 29 November 2013.
- Vocational Visit Jillian Cavanagh advised of a forthcoming visit on Wednesday 27 November 2013 to the Kangan Institute Automotive Centre at Docklands followed by a tour of the nearby Lindsay Fox Car Museum. Cost is \$25 inclusive of finger food.
- Volunteer Hours Russell Rolls announced that he was now the chief recorder of volunteer hours of Club members. He sought details by email (when, where and what) of any such hours since 1 July and continuing advices in future.
- Director's Report International Service Presentation : Roy Garrett, fresh from his return from Myanmar, gave an update on what the International Service Committee had been focussing on. Roy spoke of the funds which had been spent on renovating and improving impoverished schools outside Luang Prabang in Northern Laos including the Hue Kang High School and the proposed Ban Houe Tout school project.

#### LAUNCH OF 2013 CHRISTMAS HAMPER APPEAL

As of recent times, there will be 2 beneficiaries (as nominated by the colour of the Hamper bags (Red or Green), the Steps Outreach Service (Red bag) and the Lentara UnitingCare Asylum Seeker Project (Green bag). Bags were available for collection at the meeting and will continue to be, along with flyers which detail suggested goods for each bag.

Anne Mitchell spoke briefly, indicating that Steps came into contact with about 150 youth each year, including about 50 who are supported intensively.

messages was that unless people are part of the whole activity, they have no ownership. They must be involved from the beginning, learning how to use and how to fix.. This simple recipe leads to sustaining developing countries.
