Established in 1877, Berry Street's core activity has always been protecting children and strengthening families so they can provide better care for their children. Today Berry Street is the largest child and family services organisation in Victoria, helping over 24,000 Victorians over the past year.

Berry Street never gives up doing whatever it takes for kids because it believes that all children should have a good childhood, growing up feeling safe, nurtured and with hope for the future.

Tom Brunzell began his career in education as a Teach for America (TFA) corps member at NYC P.S. #28 in the Bronx. After taking the role as Lead Mathematics Teacher and professional developer for the school, he also became a Corps Member Advisor at the TFA institute for new teacher training. He now serves as Senior Advisor, Teaching and Learning, for Berry Street, working with school leaders, teachers, and their regions in the areas of school culture and curriculum development.

Since his arrival in 2011, Berry Street has collaboratively worked on raising expectations for student outcomes, accountability for visible learning, and diligently holding students accountable for their behaviour. By providing staff development around curriculum, school culture and student management, Tom has led this growth through mentorships with school leaders, lead teachers, and content teaching teams.

A Yale University graduate, Tom is also a PhD candidate at the University of Melbourne Graduate School of Education, studying trauma-informed pedagogy, positive psychology and their impacts on workplace meaning.

Garden DesignFest Presentation

Jill Forsyth and Chris Hewett from the RC of Kew spoke about the Garden DesignFest development. It is now presenting its sixth biennial GardenFest and has raised in excess of \$300,000.00 (2012 - over \$100,000.00). Gardens have been opened throughout Melbourne and on the Mornington Peninsula.

Our Club will be involved this year with four gardens at Euroa on Sunday 16 November. This involves garden captains and volunteers from our Club for the four gardens arranging for support e.g.. bus groups to Euroa, marketing through Shepparton New estate agents' boards, garden design web page and Garden DesignFest Facebook page.

Jill suggested that we should try to partner with charities with their websites and the data base. There was also support from Tourism Victoria. Use all media. Media do need content. Tickets for the lot are selling at \$45.00.

Guest speaker

Our guest speaker was Susan McLaine, a bibliotherapist (Herb Greenwood read out her background details which were in last week's bulletin to some extent). Susan has been involved with bibliotherapy since 2008. Bibliotherapy involves the use of literature to help people deal with physical and psychological problems.

The therapy focuses on enabling individuals to gain knowledge from without and wisdom from within to discover the individual's self. The therapy involves doing so by means of stories and discussion groups.

Initially libraries were established in psychiatric hospitals and, during the war years, in convalescent hospitals to assist patient recovery. From the mid 20th century bibliotherapy evolved with the de-institutionalisation of mental health, and the provision of a wider range of treatments and therapies for patients. It has moved to educational, aged care and Department of Justice use. It concentrates on creativity.

Susan became involved from 2008 when she was undertaking an Honours thesis involving State Library development. She was influenced by Blake Morrison's book "Reading Curves" and then encouraged by Sally Heath (then an editor at The Age) to promote "Creative Bibliotherapy". She has also been influenced by a Boston Institute of Massachusetts program "Changing Lives Through Literature", an alternative program to jail developed in Boston, USA.

Creative Bibliotherapy is promoted through groups to assist people who don't or can't read well. It supports them to read aloud, to undertake voluntary discussion and to help deal with emotional issues and expressing deeply held concerns. It provides a means for individuals to use their imagination. Its benefits include social aspects, being part of a group, "well being" in mind, developing a sense of being valued, and a willingness to give time and attention to others in the group. Stories lead to discussion on our behavior with others. Text reading is very important.

In 2010 St Vincent's approached her to start a group for homeless people or people at risk.

of homelessness, often with alcohol or dementia issues, often suffering the stigma withdrawal from the community and often feeling isolated. She became involved with the group and also with a Department of Justice Group run by St Vincent's.

Susan then read to us a short extract from Nelson Mandela's writings from around 1960 when he was still in prison, and his reaction to his mother's death and his eldest son's death. She said that this extract has a particular impact on group members who often then want to share their own thoughts. The group bibliotherapy programme makes such a difference to individuals.

President Roy closed the meeting and reminded us to "light up Rotary".
