PRESENTATION: VET Sector: get rich scheme for shonks and shysters

Urged on by the business community, the government has sought to revive competition policy through the outsourcing of public service delivery. The market, they say, can solve most problems.

Australia's private vocational education system has turned into a \$4 billion get-rich quick scheme for shonks and shysters. It is now almost twice as expensive as Labor's home insulation scheme. As privatisation move further into public life through new markets in health, disability, education, prisons and so on, strong properly funded regulators, well-thought out legislation and adequate sanctions for wrong-doing are crucial.
