Topic: Central Melbourne Sunrise's Iftar Dinner

Muslims fast for 30 consecutive days during Ramadan, from dawn until sunset. Iftar is the special meal prepared daily at the end of the day when the fast finishes. Muslims are encouraged to reach out, to build bridges and to work with colleagues and neighbours around them who are not Muslim, to share their faith and build on their shared values. The Iftar meal is a special time of day, as this is when Muslims open their fast and give thanks for the food they are eating.

Andrew is well known to club members. He is presently Victoria Police Assistant Commissioner for the North West Metropolitan Region. In recent years he has managed the counter terrorism coordination unit, led a project team to establish the Australia New Zealand Policing Advisory Agency, worked as a Divisional Manager based at Knox and then as the Assistant Commissioner for the specialist units of the Operations Support Department.

Ali is the son of Turkish Muslim immigrants who knows first hand the experience of being vilified at school in Melbourne's northern suburbs. He has done considerable reading on Islam and this knowledge of the religion has assisted him greatly with multicultural liaison work within Vic Police.

MEETING REPORT 3rd JUNE

Our meeting on 3 June proceeded with reduced numbers – about 20 members - as we had a fair contingent of members participating in the Rotary International Convention in Sydney. Neville Taylor ably demonstrated that no person is really indispensable, as he calmly and methodically filled a number of roles during this meeting including that of President Doug, who was attending the International Convention.

Director's Report (Club Admin)

Neville Taylor delivered the Club Admin report, which demonstrated the very high level of activity underway at this time of the year. Activity, events and general announcements include:

- The finalisation of the events schedule and duty roster for July to October, inclusive
- The imminent handover of the Club Administration Chair to Roger Thornton
- About 130 confirmations for the Victoria Police Leaders Mentoring breakfast on 17 June
- Organisation for the changeover dinner at the Athenaeum Club on Friday, 27 June, is well underway
- The club planning forum (Horizons) is scheduled for 8.30am to 12.30pm on 22 June. Venue is the Montague Continuing Education Centre, 100 Montague St, South Melbourne
- The last regular club meeting this year will be 10 June.

Sergeant's Session

The Sergeant's session featured an historical walk through significant events which have occurred on 3 June, or thereabouts. Events mentioned included the wedding of Edward, Duke of Windsor, to American divorcee Wallis Simpson, which precipitated his abdication in 1936; the Battle of Midway (1942); the first space walk by a US astronaut (1962); the resignation of John Profumo, the British Secretary of State for War (1963 - he would do that, wouldn't't he?); the sustained attack by Israeli forces on the USS Liberty, during the Six-Day War (1966). An astute member pointed out to the Sergeant that he has missed the most significant event of all to occur around this date: the D-Day landings in 1944. The Sergeant showed his appreciation for this information by promptly fining the before-mentioned astute member. The Sergeant showed a slide indicating a pilot's view of night-time aircraft carrier landings, followed by Mary's aboveaveragely-eloquent contribution to "the epic poem", which is mercifully shuddering to a close.

Guest Speaker

Gordon Morrison, Director of the Art Gallery of **Ballarat**, presented an engaging dissertation on the history of Scottish migration to Australia. The Art Gallery of **Ballarat** is currently exhibiting the contribution made by Scots to the development of Australia as educationalists, missionaries, philanthropists and entrepreneurs. [Exhibition "<u>For Auld Lang</u> <u>Syne: Images of Scottish Australia from First Fleet to Federation</u>" Open **`til** Sunday 27th July 2014]

The presentation included the early history when Scots were transported to the colony of NSW as political prisoners and forgers. Gordon explained "the good the bad and the downright ugly" of Scottish migration, ranging from Mary MacKillop to Governors Macquarie and Brisbane, David Syme (co-founder of The Age), and the great outback explorers Major Thomas Mitchell and John McDouall Stuart.

Not beyond a little polite sledging of the English, Gordon explained that very few convicts of Scottish origin were ever transported to Australia. The reason for this was attributed to regular reading of the bible on Sundays by the strictly

Presbyterian population of Scotland at the time and the high level of literacy that this caused (*Ed*: I think this was a subtle way of implying that the canny Scots were too smart to get caught although the Scottish justice system had a third verdict category of 'case not proven', unlike the remainder of the convict donor countries.)

A viewing of the exhibition at the Art Gallery of Ballarat is highly recommended. In the best tradition of Scottish stereotypes, together with the long memories of most Europeans, Gordon recommended our attendance on 24 June 2014. On that day entry to the exhibition is free, in memory of a rare victory against the English at the Battle of Bannockburn in 1314.

Questions had to be curtailed owing to time and between them Herb and Neville closed the meeting only two minutes late.

POSITIONS VACANT

District 9800 is looking for two new leaders to help with key District programmes.

1. A volunteer Rotarian to coordinate Rotary Australia Benevolent Society ["RABS"] activities in 2014/2015.

Position brief;

Rotary clubs may apply for registration and gain tax deductibility for projects that arouse the compassion of the community and will provide direct relief to people in need in local communities.

The Coordinator will report to the District Chair of Rotary Australia World Community Service (RAWCS) and will be required to:

- review RABS applications for their suitability for registration
- attend bi-monthly RAWCS Committee meetings
- submit a brief monthly summary of RABS activities.

2. Rotary Overseas Medical Aid for Children (ROMAC) is inviting applications for a Chairperson for District 9800 for 2014/2015.

Position brief;

ROMAC assists children aged fifteen years or younger, by bringing them to Australia or New Zealand for lifesaving or dignity restoring procedures to improve their quality of life. Cases are accepted only when the required medical treatment is not available to them in their own country. Patients come from developing countries in South East Asia and the Pacific Islands.

The ROMAC District Chair is appointed by the District Governor. Primary responsibilities will focus on:

- Awareness of ROMAC within the District and its Rotary Clubs
- Fundraising and promotion
- Care and support of ROMAC patients and their parents/guardian.

A background in the health sector is desirable but not essential. Applicants should have sound administration skills. You will not be expected to do all of this on your own; you will be assisted and supported by others within the ROMAC "family". There are also guidelines and procedures available in the ROMAC Manual of Procedures to guide activities. A hand-over by the experienced incumbent will also be arranged.
