Guest Speaker

Bill Layton: The making of the Twin Gorges Walk in Fitzroy Crossing, Fitzroy Valley, Kimberley, Western Australia



Bill is an engineer [almost retired] and has spent most of his working life in mining projects in regional and remote Australia, including north west Western Australia. About 7 years ago, Bill was introduced to a remarkable aboriginal woman, June Oscar AO, and her friends Pat Davies [country singer] and Emily Carter. They have become Bill's great friends and his trips to the Fitzroy Valley area

have become longer and more frequent. This year Bill spent 2 months in Fitzroy Crossing mapping out this walking trail and undertaking a pro-bono building project.

The walking trail project is being carried out to create a sustainable enterprise for a local aboriginal native title holder group-the Bunuba People.

The walk covers two 400 million year old gorge systems and part of the biggest river in eth Kimberley [in Australia when flowing]-the Fitzroy River. The walk covers some rugged and remarkably beautiful country and includes some amazing rock art, amazing bird life and bush. It will be guided by the Bunuba Rangers Group and will be vehicle assisted to suit patrons' walking ability. Ultimately it will be part of an eco-tourism venture based in Fitzroy Crossing and employing mainly aboriginal people.

Director's Report – International, presented by Kevin Love with apologies from Rob Hines



The Women's Resource Centre now has a strategy to keep the Co-ordinator, who was going to be lost due to funding cuts. Next week's guest speaker, Bill Layton, is involved with Fitzroy Crossing and his wife owns the Ark Store that works with the Women's Resource Centre.

A District Grant has been gained for the Laos school project. Members of the tour group to this project, organised by Roy, have donated \$16,000.

A budget request has been made to the RCCM-S Board for a number of projects but there will be special fundraising efforts for the Indigenous and Laos projects.

Kevin reminded members to book for the **Sports Breakfast Fundraiser** on the 20^{th} August and noted the need for help with obtaining raffle prizes.

Guest Speaker - Tony Walker



Tony gave a quietly impassioned overview of the issues he sees as a Director of the Foundation for Alcohol Research and Education [FARE]. While recognising that Australia has a hard drinking culture stemming back to the



rum rebellion, he sees a great need for a reduction in the excesses of alcohol consumption. His passion for action comes from the effects seen on his family and friends, as well as very disturbing statistics. More than 5,500 lives are lost every year and more than 157,000 people hospitalised. The high personal and financial toll extends well beyond the individual drinker. Each year in Australian nearly 400 people die and 70,000 are victims of alcohol-related assaults, including 24,000 victims of alcohol-related domestic violence. As we know, indigenous and remote communities are particularly harmed.

Originally set up in 2001 with over \$100M raised from an additional tax on alcohol, FARE has moved from being mainly a granting body to taking more direct action. They are an alternative voice to the very influential alcohol industry and its Drinkwise Campaign. Action includes, for example: seeking to have the low wholesale tax regime on wine reviewed to be in line with the higher alcohol content tax that is otherwise applicable; redressing the increasing number of active liquor outlets, which has led to one outlet per 200 Victorians over 18 year old; and partnering with Rosemary Batty to reverse the trend of increasing harm to children and families caused by alcohol.

RC CANTERBURY FUN BIKE RIDES

BICYCLE RIDING CAN BE FUN: RC CANTERBURY MEMBERS CAN ATTEST TO IT



Many Rotary Clubs are thick with retirees but don't appear to do much to bond them together. In contrast, Canterbury RC has been running weekly bike rides of about 35km on Tuesdays for more than five years, with great results in comradeship and health. Max Holland 68, the club's newsletter editor, says up to 10 go on the rides and their average age is

70+. The eldest is more than 75. The group includes three non-Rotary friends. "Our club meets on Monday evening so we get together to set up the route," he says. "The big need is to get a tail wind!"

The group's homes are well dispersed but it's easy for them to unite via trains. As preferred by MetLink, they use the rear door of the last carriage, which has the extra space for all the bikes. A typical ride starts at the last station on the line as nearly all the end stations are near a bike path. There is a brief coffee break after about an hour of riding, then a couple of hours later it is time for a senior's meal at a hotel or at an RSL. A recent trip started at Craigieburn, and came back along the linear Broadmeadows Valley Park and then beside the Moonee Ponds Creek, re-boarding the train at Strathmore after enjoying an excellent senior's lunch at the Cross Keys Hotel. Max says. "One of our group, past President Gerry Cross, joined us two years ago and found it taxing at first but now he says he's got better strength, balance and fitness. There are hundreds of kilometres of separate bike paths in Melbourne and we stick to

these trails. We've never had an accident."
The rides are recorded and mapped by the iPhone app MotionX with photos and a map of the route posted to the club members' only Yammer social network. #
