<u>Guest Speaker</u> – Jeff Maynard 'Sir Hubert Wilkins' and 'The Photographic Record of WW1'

Jeff Maynard, a prolific author, spoke his research into Sir Hubert Wilkins, soldier photographer, Arctic and Antarctica explorer. Jeff's books include *The Letterbox War of Kamarooka Street; Niagara's Gold; Divers in Time;* and *Wings of Ice.* His latest book, *The Unseen Anzac*, tells the story of Sir Hubert Wilkins the official Anzac photographer during World War I.

Jeff discovered Sir Hubert's lost records in America in 2014, and uses them to reveal the story of a man that Australia has largely forgotten.
