Destiny Rescue – Our Successes and New Initiatives



Destiny Rescue (DR) is an internationally-recognized non-profit organisation dedicated to rescuing children trapped in the sex trade. Their vision is to rescue the sexually exploited and enslaved, restore the abused, protect the vulnerable, empower the poor and be a voice for those who can't speak up for themselves.

They currently operate various programs in Thailand, Cambodia, the Philippines and India. DR also has offices in three donor nations: United States, Australia and New Zealand.

Since 2011, DR has rescued nearly 2000 children enslaved around the world, helped keep hundreds more from entering the sex trade through various prevention programs, ensured justice for those who have been wronged, and raised awareness to untold numbers.

Destiny Rescue realises that human trafficking is a global problem. They're determined to set captives free worldwide. Until no more children are sold, forced or coerced into the sex trade, Destiny Rescue is fully committed to fighting for their freedom, their restoration and their futures.

Jacqui has recently been appointed as Destiny Rescue's Community Partnerships Manager for Victoria, having spent the majority of her career in senior roles in the education sector, primarily at Christian schools in Whyalla and Melbourne. Jacqui will present details of Destiny Rescue's work locally and abroad, including details of community partnerships in place and the organisations plans for the future.

### **GUEST SPEAKER LAST TUESDAY**

**Philip L Corme, C.E.O., Mosaic Advisory and Capital  
“Impact Investing and Community Renewal with a Social Enterprise.”**

Motivated by the substantial funding shortfall needed to achieve the UN Sustainable Development Goals, our guest speaker, Philip Cormie, has been working with the Asia Pacific Social Impact Centre to develop an Impact Investing approach which can deliver comparable or better financial returns than mainstream alternatives.

He observed that based on current trends, most financial portfolios will be unable to continue to generate their current returns where they are already fully priced or overpriced. Therefore, operations of social enterprises undertaken must become “investable instruments” allowing funds flow at scale from institutional investors. This was identified as the biggest growth potential to reinvigorate the economy (with the core portfolio being owned by big financial institutions).

In partnership with community, universities and government, he is rebuilding regional towns (increasing fund flow). His social enterprise pilot combines a series of complementary businesses around education, applied innovation and incubation to compliment the end to end production of apple cider from planting and growing to production and retail at a once abandoned school site.

His approach is to analyse financial, risk, and social returns as well as value chain impacts. He demonstrated an analysis of how to invest in “chronic disease” (by measuring the preventable reductions in levels of income against beneficiaries of that surplus). He also discussed investing transition towards the individual investor nominating preferences and subject areas of interest rather than broad funds.
