"On 1st September 2016, our foundation, The Rotary Foundation scored a 100% rating by Charity Navigator for financial transparency and accountability, making it equal first in the rating of the "Best Charities Everyone's Heard of".

Charity Navigator said that charitable givers should feel confident that these national institutions put their donations to good use. The organisation, Charity Navigator, is a US not-for-profit evaluator of charities based on criteria such as transparency, reporting, use of funds etc.

This is fantastic news in the 100th year of The Rotary Foundation.

Club plans for the Foundation this year include:

- Support the Group Vocational Exchange with Group Leader Michael Lapina.
- We will be looking for candidates to apply for the 2 year and 3 month Peace scholarships

As it is the centennial year and The Foundation was started by a donation of US\$26.50. RI President John Germ has encouraged each member of Rotary to donate an equivalent sum during this year. If this happens it would raise an additional 30 million for the Foundation to do good in the world.

Our aim is for 100 per cent participation from club members and I will be sending out a "pretty please" email.

We will be supporting PolioPlus "Purple Pinkie Day" – more on that in October. We have some other aims however will hold those over for another day.

As a matter of interest over the last four years our club has benefited from The Foundation District Grants to the amount of \$24,200 for both overseas and local projects. On the other side we have contributed \$10,750 to the pot of money these grants came from.



To finish we have a video highlighting some of the work that The Foundation supports through the six areas of focus being –

- Peace and conflict prevention/resolution.
- Disease prevention and treatment.
- Water and sanitation.
- Maternal and child health.
- Basic education and literacy.
- Economic and community development.

I look forward to us supporting The Rotary Foundation "To do good in the world".
