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Announcements:

Allan Driver reminded members about the **DIK Working Bee** and BBQ on Sunday March 27th. He also announced an **Inter-Club Visit** to RC Albert Park on April 13th.

Frank O'Brien made two **Vocational Service** announcements. The first is a visit to Roy Garrett's chemical plant on May 29th. The second announcement was the rescheduled visit to Melbourne Water Treatment Plant, now to proceed on Friday November 18th.

Michael Wells thanked the team that helped with the barbecue for Saturday's **Lord Mayor's Student Welcome** conducted along Northbank.

Guest Speaker:

Chair for the day Honorary Member Lou Butterfield introduced Professor Glen Mola of UPNG who spoke on the topic of "Achieving good outcomes in maternity care with minimal resources". In his introduction Lou explained that he had spent five months in PNG helping to establish the first Obstetrics program at UPNG under what we would regard as very primitive circumstances.

Carmel Walker of the Royal and New Zealand College of Obstetrics and Gynecologists (RANZOG) thanked the club for its donation that has been used to publish educational brochures.

Glen Mola went to PNG as a schoolboy and apart from his medical training, which he undertook in Melbourne, he has been there ever since. He showed a photo of a PNG mother giving birth on the tiled floor at his ward explaining that due to a lack of funding this is routine in PNG. The last ward was built in 1981!

Notwithstanding the shortage of resources Glen's team has seen the birth rate treble whilst the number of adverse outcomes has been held constant. This is impressive given the low spend on heath in PNG. In developed economies >\$5,000 per person per annum is spent compared to less than \$100 in undeveloped economies. PNG spends approximately 3% of GDP annually on health compared to approximately 9% in Australia, and of course Australia's GDP per head vastly outweighs that in PNG.

Glen went on to compare the performance of his obstetrics team to comparable services in Africa and Australia. He outlined the strategies he has implemented to improve outcomes for mothers and babies in the face of very limited funding, remoteness, illiteracy and an apparent indifferent political interest. He described the approaches to prenatal and postnatal care, including ensuring there was careful planning for getting the expectant mother to the centre in time, notwithstanding that this might be in a canoe!

Of particular interest was the very low rate of cesarean section births in PNG; only 4 percent compared to 25 percent in Australia. Postnatal care after a cesarean section birth is very difficult to manage when the mother usually returns to remote villages, and every effort is made to avoid the use of cesarean section, perhaps the reverse of the trend in an affluent society like ours.

According to the World Bank, 75 million children, 41 million of them girls, lack access to basic education. More than one in four adults, two-thirds of them women, cannot read or write.

Access to education, particularly completion of primary schooling, increases child survival rates, reduces the spread of preventable disease, and increases people's ability to improve their economic well-being.

March is Rotary Literacy Month. This is an excellent opportunity for clubs to focus their efforts on basic education and literacy, one of Rotary's six areas of focus. There are many types of projects clubs can undertake to increase literacy.
