<u>Guest Speaker: Steven Wells, from Austin Health's Royal Talbot</u> Rehabilitation Centre



Steven is a registered nurse, horticultural therapist and gardens project officer with Austin Health. Over the past eight years, the grounds of Royal Talbot have been transformed from bare lawn into lush gardens. During that time, Steven's role has morphed from one hour weekly of management approved nursing time in the gardens

with patients to a campus wide paid position covering nursing, horticulture and project roles. Patients are able to engage in speech therapy by talking in and about the gardens and occupational therapy by gardening. The gardens are sensory – sight, smell, taste – acting as an instrument for patients to achieve goals in real life activities in a non-threatening environment and also promote interaction between patients, visitors and staff; that is, you have to see these gardens! Glades and paths are designed to cater to the needs of patients. For example, there are minimal seats in a glade so that wheelchairs can be accommodated. The garden is designed to be drought-proof and low maintenance and bird life has increased significantly since the gardens have been built. The gardens are also used by staff as a tool for alleviating the stress inherent in such a demanding job.

Steven thanked RCCM-S for participating in the gardens because the project is clearly working and by participating, community groups better understand the people across the campus. During question time Keith Frampton reinforced this point with the inspiring account of how his son completed an IT Doctorate after a long period of rehabilitation following a serious head injury in his youth. Neville John congratulated Steven on the gardens being included in the 2010 Garden Design Fest and being a Silver medal winner in the Melbourne International Flower and Garden Show. As Garden Project Officer, Steven is working to promote sponsorship and works with researchers to put an Australian context to the body of research already existing in international journals.

Chairman Kevin thanked Steven for keeping us updated and presented him with a token of our appreciation.

President Kevin closed the meeting.

NOMINATIONS CALLED FOR GSE TEAM $\underline{\mathsf{MEMBERS}}$ TO INDIA and/or USA

Nominations are being called for throughout our District for Rotarians to nominate young professionals 25-40 years of age to apply to be a GSE Team Member.

Applicants must not be a current Rotarian but, with recent change, may be a relative of a Rotary member. They must be an Australian citizen.

Two GSE Teams are being supported by District next year to travel for 4 weeks to either:

- * Central India (District 3030) leaves 14th January 2012 home on 15th February 2012
- * Central California, USA (District 5230) leaves 22nd April 2012 home on 22nd May 2012

Teams are composed of 4 members, usually of various business and professional backgrounds and one experienced Rotarian Leader.

Team members can come from corporations, small businesses, community

organisations, medical and educational facilities, government offices and notfor-profit agencies.

They must be currently employed full-time and must have worked in their vocational field for at least 2 years by the time of application. They must either be employed or reside within District 9800.

Applications close for Team Members to District 3030-India on 19th September 2011 and for District 5230- USA on 14th November 2011.
