Chair Frank O'Brien introduced himself for a vocational talk as a man who needs no introduction. He is a Fellow of the CPAs, has a law degree from Melbourne University and a Diploma in Financial Planning. He finds he uses this background every day in his financial services work with Sandhurst Trustees, a subsidiary of Bendigo Bank. He has been 50 years in the workforce and is manager of corporate trusts, a major custodial division. Sandhurst is the largest Victorian based property custodian with billions of assets such as shopping centres and child care centres, office blocks, etc.

Peter Lake as Sergeant raised funds at a record rate per minute by the simple expedient of fining everyone who isn't bald. Kay Stevens did her customary excellent job showing members how to login and accept events on the club website, especailly our Christmas party. It was clarified that logging in, one's two names are not case sensitive.

Announcements

Tom Callander as Club Protection Officer, urged all to register for working with children, mentioning that even Community Village work at night could be fall under the legislation.

Tony Thomas urged members to sign up as early birds by December 9th for District Conference in

Melbourne next March.

John Meehan announced that the club's nominee for Group Study in California next year, Adam McKie, had won endorsement to the team. Our other applicant Sara Thomas had withdrawn due to work pressures.

Keith Frampton mentioned that our ex-members Rod and Helen Norman are enjoying life as vignerons.

Guest Speaker: John Liddell, Beyond Zero Emissions (BZE)

John has been a Richmond Rotarian for 15 years and a friend of Rotary. BZE is a not-for-profit group of engineers, scientists, academics, etc dedicated to working for 100% renewable energy sources within 10 years. This would help maintain a safe climate regime confining global warning to 2 degrees, by deleting fossil fuels from the Australian energy mix. He cited the technology of solar based power with efficient storage, that could indeed supply base-load power. In Spain a plant at Torresol already provides baseload solar power 24 hours daily using molten salt storage. The technology had ramped up from 10MW (US 1996) to 20MW at Torresol with 100MW planned in Nevada in 2013. The Spanish plant involves Siemens, ACS and Google backers. He said Australia with its vast sunlight could replicate the technology. He cited costs of supplying the necessary energy on a business as usual basis in the coming decade and said the new technology could be competitive, given appropriate carbon dioxide pricing levels. In a lively question session, John said global warming threats made such technology imperitive.

Meeting Closing

In closing President Kevin urged Christmas hamper bags to be collected, filled and returned at our next two meetings. He mentioned the Christmas card sale situation is unclear. He said the Community Village project had commenced in the past fortnight thanks to the work of Alan Seale, Richard Stone and many volunteers.

He urged participation in Docklands RC Sailing Day on December 11th and mentioned that there are many enjoyable get-togethers planned for the District Conference outside the official program. There would be focus groups for new members, alumni gatherings of ex-GSE teams, Women in Rotary meetings and many group sessions for veteran Rotarians.



Friendship Exchange good news stories continue by THOMAS, Tony

The eleven member party who visited South Africa last May are continuing to get wonderful feedback from their introduction to the JBay Recycling Project at Jeffreys Bay, on the south coast of South Africa. The visit has now led to one boy being rescued from enrolment at a school for mentally disabled, to enrolemnt at a trade school where he can fulfill his dream to become a motor mechanic.

This project involveds children from the poverty-stricken and AIDS ravaged local township who earn token money called 'Mulas' by bringing in rubbish for recycling. They can then spend the money at a special Mula shop on goods donated by Rotarians, business and the community, from biscuits to bicyles.

A \$500 special donation was sourced from our group, to look after a delightful boy Adrian, about 16 years

old. To this sponsorship a Jeffreys Bay sponsor added a further donation. Carina de Flamingh, JBay organizer, has emailed this new update:

"Magic and more! Adrian was noticed by the volunteers for his helpful and friendly attidtude at the project and so began a beautiful friendship. Adrian became one of the first of our recycle clients to volunteer in the swop shop by helping younger children with the exciting task of choosing how to spend their hard earned Mulas! We got to know bits and pieces of his life story and also noticed that Adrian usually answered questions with one word, that he never seems to read but listens carefully and remembers like an elephant. The social worker dealing with Adrian then informed us that Adrian's literacy skills are so poor that he will be transferred to a school for teh mentally handicapped by the end of this year. We all knew that it was not the place for this bright young boy.

With sponsorships from Margaret, wife of a Rotarian in Australia, and Gerrie, a friend and volunteer, Adrian started a literacy training program with Melainie, from Wise Eyes. We were optimistic and also wondered what will happend to Adrian's dream of becoming a motor mechanic. Soon after starting the literacy classes, Adrian started initiating conversations, using sentences and making eye contact.

Adrian was evaluated last week at his present school and he has improved so much that he is able to attend the Bergsig Trade schooll in Uitenhage next year and do his training to become a mechanic.

Carina in another briefing mentions how big the recycling project has become. On the Friday pick-up day of December 5, 260 kids arrived with 3 tonnes of glass, paper, plastics and other junk. As a thank-you for their hard work through the year, they received Christmas bonuses of 700 packets of biscuits, 250 books, 300 gingerbread men, 250 t-shirts, loads of Thom shoes and other desirables. The grant total of rubbish pick-ups for 2011, involving 39 Monday collections, was 62.5 tonnes brought in by 1657 children.
