- The farmers Market in the City will have its debut in August and further details will be provided early in the New Year.
- The 2nd IFTAR dinner will be held on 2/7/15 and bookings are now open.

These announcements were then followed by breakfast.

DG Murray Verso commenced the formal proceedings by giving an overview of the program on behalf of Districts 9780, 9790, 9800 and 9810.

- The program has given him great enjoyment over the 8 years that it has been running
- This year there were Rotarians from 4 out of the 5 districts in Victoria participating
- There have been 140 participants who have gone through the program since its inception in 2007.
- The program changed this year with Business mentors mentoring the senior ranks on strategy and Rotary members providing their mentees with an opportunity to develop skills in community engagement.
- Some great results have been observed with a number of important community engagement programs being instigated
- The program has benefits to both organisations Rotarians gain a greater understanding of the policing and Rotary has had the benefit of 2 GSE participants form Vic Pol and 4 Peace scholars have been drawn from the ranks of VicPol.

DG Murray's talk was then followed by Assistant Commissioner Kevin Casey who gave an overview of the program on behalf of Victoria Police.

- Kevin also talked about the new direction that the program had taken this year, which was instigated by former commissioner Ken Lay, who was keen to see VicPol engage in community partnerships and instill community confidence in the police force.
- The program provides great value to senior leaders through the opportunity to participate in various programs.
- He also listed a number of other benefits to participants including the ability to forge stronger community networks, improved capability and creating lasting relationships with Rotarians.
- He concluded by thanking the steering committee and in particular those who were leaving the committee. He also chose to thank Superintendent Neville Taylor from our club for his great leadership whilst being a syndicate leader over a number of years.

Kevin was followed by Garry Thompson from the Rotary club of Sandringham who provided an overview of the program on behalf of a Rotary Mentor.

 Gary talked about a project that he had been involved in with his mentee James. The project involved establishing a program to teach disadvantaged youth to drive. It was completed on time and on budget and also raised money to purchase a Mazda 2 which is parked at the Sandringham Police station through the help of sponsors and fundraising activities.

Finally Senior Sergeant Mark Williams gave his perspective of the program on behalf of a Police Mentee.

- Mark spoke about his move to a rural area and his initial lack of experience in dealing with a rural community. He also noted the differences between a farming community and an urban one.
- He identified the need to build resilience within the community, particularly in emergency situations like bushfires. There was also a need to be aware of vulnerable people in the community who did not necessarily have access to phones or the internet.
- The help of his Rotary mentor was invaluable in assisting him to understand community involvement and he praised his local rotary club for the time that it devoted to helping him.
- He also observed that Rotarians are always available to help and after seeing Rotary in action he has the attitude that people cannot say that we do not have time to do good in the community because Rotarians always find time to help.
- It was an honour for him to be selected to participate in the program and it had a great influence on him and it tested his thinking.

Certificates of appreciation were then handed over to all participants that were present by AC Tim Cartwright and DG Murray Verso.

The raffle, which raised \$850 towards Police Legacy and Community Village, was then drawn by DG Murray Verso. He managed to embarrass himself by drawing out his own ticket but generously put it back into the draw.

The Rotary Club of Echuca-Moama conducted the 52nd annual Steam Rally at Rotary Park over the Queen's Birthday weekend.

The purpose of the event is primarily to make money that we put to good use within our local community and toward the needy and unfortunate in other parts of the world.

Blessed again with fine weather – cold but dry conditions – we attracted good numbers on Saturday and even better numbers on the Sabbath. Musical entertainment was provided by the local Federal Band and the Clan MacLeod Highland Pipe Band from Bendigo.

Animal Farm attracted many young visitors on both days. Rotarians Allie and Elaine managed the site and kept all the boys and girls happy and safe as they patted bunnies, stroked chicks, chased puppies and stared in amazement at the goats and sheep

For the first time in the 52-year history of the event, we had a Rotary stall with a static display of informative material. The attendant in charge of the stall reported he signed up a new member.

Once again the volunteers in the Camp Kitchen and the Country Cooking captured the interest of visitors and did a roaring trade making stew and damper and pumpkin soup and scones and jam and Devonshire tea.

Behind-the-scenes people are a major factor in presentation of a successful project. This is certainly the case with the Steam Rally project.
