President's announcements:

- Marjorie would tell her 14 year old grand son and others: Don't be afraid to express yourself; Don't use always technology to communicate; Individuality makes you successful – not just doing your job
- Roy has 3 children and they have 3 children, he has accumulated also business wisdom over many
  years to be qualified to give some advice, he said. 1 Always communicate matters in business and

in life; 2 Have no fear ; 3 Got a talent - never walk away; 4 Don't just talk about it - just do it

- Justin (with no children, no grandchildren either) said: Keep smiling, be optimistic, be aware of the impact you have on the people around you
- Michael would advise "to control your destiny", don't be a victim of facebook imagery. "Start looking into the eye of a person, smile, show respect, talk. And when you are able to be respected you can influence the people around you, helping to make a contribution to a better world".
- The panel then responded to questions and remarks from the audience. Some key words: GenY is immensely resourceful as a result of the communication revolution; Individualism is important; Uni is not the right place for all, e.g. option to train people successfully within an organisation from ground up; Different values outside big cities: More human communication and respect seen on a street of a country town. #
